"FORGIVEN! HOW DO I KNOW THIS?"

ccasionally I will walk over to our bookshelf and pull out one of the many family photo albums to view. I enjoy looking at pictures of our children – and now grandchildren – growing up. However, two things always stand out when I look at these pictures: 1) the blonde-haired beauty always looks the same, and 2) who is the dark-haired man in these pictures?

I love to look at pictures. They are a moment in time made still. The time may be mine, they may another family belong to member or a friend, and they may even be of a time my eyes have never seen. Regardless of all that, they are indeed a time to remember. I love to look at pictures - black and white, or color – it doesn't matter. Perhaps it's because the still picture assures me that what took place in that picture was an actual event in time and that that time can never be taken away from me.

Recently, I pondered a question about forgiveness and how do I

know I am truly forgiven. I have many sins. Some I immediately recognize and instantly seek forgiveness not only from God, but just as importantly from the one I offended and harmed. And then there are some sins that go on unnoticed or unchecked. Through the hearing of the Law of God, I am awakened to this truth of my sin and I seek to receive forgiveness from both God and the one I sinned against.

Strange how my mind, after a period of time - long or short, even after receiving forgiveness, will recall my transgression. It's like my mind or better said, "my old sinful flesh," will pull down an old photo album from the shelf and randomly open to a time when moment in committed a sin. I can see the picture clearly. It happened. There is no denying it. And what is worse? I am continuously tormented by the Old Adam with guilt and shame. Then the new man in me reminds me that I am FORGIVEN! Unfortunately, the sinful flesh doesn't give in so easily. He uses the old reliable

STEWARDSHIP

n the course of time Cain brought to the Lord an offering of the fruit of the ground, and Abel also brought of the firstborn of his flock and of their fat portions. And the Lord had regard for Abel and his offering, but for Cain and his offering he had no regard" (Gen 4:2). Why did the Lord not have regard for Cain and his offering, but did regard Abel and his offering? Was it because Abel's offering was better intrinsically than Cain's? No. The Book of Hebrews tells us: "By faith Abel offered to God a more acceptable sacrifice than Cain, through which he was commended as righteous, God commending him by accepting his gifts" 11:4). The thing that (Heb distinguished Abel's offering from that of Cain's is faith. By faith, Abel offered a more acceptable offering.

Faith and giving are inseparable. They are two sides of the same coin. It is faith in the promises of God that leads us to give. By faith we trust that God will do what He says. By faith, we receive everything God gives as a gift from His divine mercy and goodness. For what do we have that we have not received (1 Cor 4:7)? Nothing. Everything we have comes from the Lord. By faith we give to others because God has first given to us, and by faith we trust that He will continue to provide for us all that we need for this

body and life. And when by faith we give, God accepts our offerings and commends us as righteous. For by faith we are accounted righteous before God on account of Christ. Giving is a spiritual issue.

But there is a flip side to this two-sided coin: Cain didn't give an offering to God by faith. His offering did not come from faith but from someplace else. And since it didn't originate with faith in God and His promises, it was not regarded by God. And he was not accounted righteous. This is a warning to us. Pay attention to your faith and your offerings, and from where they come.

From where do your offerings come? Like all good works, offerings acceptable in God's sight flow from faith in Christ. They are given in response to the gifts God has given to us, especially the gift of forgiveness of sins in Jesus Christ. And since they are given by faith, they will be the target of Satan's attacks to ruin the church, do damage to the gospel of Christ, and to weaken your faith in Him. For sin is crouching at our doors, and the temptation to sin in giving is great because of the fallen world and our sinful flesh. But Jesus is greater than our hearts. Jesus has overcome the world. And by faith, so have we. By faith, we rule over them.

tool of the devil and says, "Did God really say you're forgiven?" My mind questions and begins to doubt. I say to myself, "Am I

forgiven? How do I know this?"

Have you ever had such doubt? Have you ever questioned the grace of God in the forgiveness of sins? Has your faith ever been so rattled that you have wondered if you are truly forgiven for past sins. And if so, how do you know this for sure and with undeniable certainty?

Friends, you are obviously not alone. Because of our old Adam, the sinful world, and the evil Foe, we will always be tempted to doubt the truth of God's Word. This is what Jesus says of the Devil: "He was a murderer from the beginning, and does not stand in the truth, because there is no truth in him. When he lies, he speaks out of his own character, for he is a liar and the father of lies" (John 8:44).

Now listen to what Jesus has to say about the world: "In the world you will have tribulation. But take heart; I have overcome the world" (John 16:33b). The world will always be your enemy just as Satan and your own sinful nature will always be your enemy. But Jesus has overcome, that is, triumphed over sin, death, and Satan by His victorious resurrection from the dead.

Just listen to what Paul has to say of you: "For you have died, and your life is hidden with Christ in God. When Christ who is your life appears, then you also will appear with Him in glory" (Colossians 3:3-4). So, there is hope for you while still in this world. Yes, we desire to be with Jesus, but God's will is for

you to remain here until He calls you to be with Him in glory. While here on earth we need to hear the assurance that we are not alone to face the challenges, trials, tribulations, and temptations alone. St. John writes, "Little children, you are from God and have overcome them, for He who is in you is greater than he who is in the world" (1 John 4:4).

Now back to the question of forgiven sins. You know your sins are forgiven through the inspired and inerrant Word of God. From the very mouth of God we hear: "Blessed is the one whose transgression is forgiven, whose sin is covered" (Psalm 32:1).

The Word of God is loaded with examples of Jesus personally forgiving the sins of sinners. When people brought to Him a paralytic, lying on a bed, Jesus saw their faith and said to the paralytic, "Take heart, My son; your sins are forgiven" (Matthew 9:2).

When a sinful woman of the city came to see Jesus, He addressed all the doubters saying, "I tell you, her sins, which are many, are forgiven—for she loved much. But he who is forgiven little, loves little.' And then He said to her, "Your sins are forgiven" (Luke 7:47, 48).

Where do we go to hear Jesus forgive us our sins? We are called, gathered, and enlightened by the Holy Spirit to go where Jesus promises to be – in His Church. There is where God has called and sent men to speak in Christ's stead the words a penitent sinner longs to hear. Jesus gave us this assurance when He said to His disciples, "If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven them" (John 20:23a). Therefore, as a called and ordained servant of the Word, announce the grace God unto all of you, and in the stead and by the command of my Lord Jesus Christ I forgive you all your sins

in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

Having received forgiveness from me, as from God Himself, we are now set free to forgive our neighbor. Jesus instructs us, "Judge not, and you will not be judged; condemn not, and you will not be condemned; forgive, and you will be forgiven" (Luke 6:37).

Listen now to some portions of Holy Scripture that shall strengthen your faith in the assurance your sins are forgiven.

Paul writes, "Blessed are those whose lawless deeds are forgiven, and whose sins are covered; blessed is the man against whom the Lord will not count his sin" (Romans 4:7-8).

And he says again, "Anyone whom you forgive, I also forgive. Indeed, what I have forgiven, if I have forgiven anything, has been for your sake in the presence of Christ, so that we would not be outwitted by Satan; for we are not ignorant of his designs" (2 Corinthians 2:10-11).

And again he says, "And you, who were dead in your trespasses and the uncircumcision of your flesh, God made alive together with [Jesus], having forgiven us all our trespasses, by canceling the record of debt that stood against us with its legal demands. This He set aside, nailing it to the cross" (Colossians 2:13-14).

God made it clear from the beginning, "Indeed, under the law almost everything is purified with blood, and without the shedding of blood there is no forgiveness of sins' (Hebrews 9:22).

Therefore, "When Christ had offered for all time a single sacrifice for sins, He sat down at the right hand of God, waiting from that time until His enemies should be made a footstool for His feet. For by a single offering He has perfected for all time those who are being sanctified. And the Holy Spirit also bears witness to us; for after saying, "This is the covenant that I will make with them after those days, declares the Lord: I will put My laws on their hearts, and write them on their minds," then He adds, 'I will remember their sins and their lawless deeds no more.' Where there is forgiveness of these, there is no longer

any offering for sin" (Hebrews 10:12-18).

Like I said when I opened with this article, I love to look at pictures. They tell of time that actually happened in history. When it comes to knowing my sins are forgiven, there is only on picture to look at for assurance. The picture appears on this page. It's not too difficult to notice. It's a picture of Jesus' crucifixion; His death on the cross. What happened in that picture, in the moment in history? He's paying the price for sin - all sin your sin and my sin, the sin of your brother and sister, the sin of your spouse, child, and parent with His precious and innocent blood. Underneath the picture is a caption. When reading the caption can you hear what He is saying? It sounds like this: "I love you. You are FORGIVEN!" And His sacrifice on the cross, His atonement for all sin can never be taken away. His righteous act belongs to you.

ear brothers and sisters in Christ, we are now in month three of our travels. After leaving the upper peninsula of Michigan we drove south along the west coast overlooking Lake Michigan. One dose not have to go to the tropics to see the various hues of blue in the water and sandy beaches.

The cities of Patroskey and Traverse are show pieces along with their homes and landscaping. The weather moderating effect of Lake Michigan makes it possible to grow many different types of fruit. Cherries is the main product of this area but we got here too late. Farmer's road side stands had plums, apples, tomatoes and sweet corn. Boy were the plums and apples good.

We went to the Sleeping Bear Dunes National Seashore. What a beautiful park. Heavily wooded with hardwoods making it seem like the park road went through a tunnel of trees. The dunes along the shore are huge and you are cautioned to stay on the paths. If one goes off the path it would be like going down a ski slope takes 20 minutes to slide down but two hours to climb back up. If the rangers have to come and help you get back up it gets pretty costly.

The high light of Michigan for us was spending two days visiting with Glenn & Marlene Mossner. One could not ask for better hosts and tour guides.

The first day we had lunch with Glenn, Marlene and Gerald Schreiner we toured the Mossner farm which has been in his family for over 100 years, the lovely and historic church's they worship in when they are not in Florida, and of course Frankenmuth. We enjoyed Frankenmuth, so much we went back the following day with Glenn and Marlene. Frankenmuth is set up like a

Bavarian city in which the main theme is Christmas. They even have a full size replica of the Austrian chapel in which



Silent Night was first played. In the chapel there is a picture of Gerald installing the star on the chapel.

We had a great time enjoying Glenn's home made fruit wines and Marlene's wonderful baking and their wonderful hospitality. What fun.

On to Ohio, where we drove along the shore of Lake Erie. 12th largest lake in the world but the shallowest of the great lakes. We stopped at Marblehead Lighthouse State Park. It has great views of the lake and the islands off shore. Great place for taking pictures. There were three wedding parties there having there pictures taken Highlight for us was stopping at the Magee Marsh Wildlife area. This is a top spot to see different migrating birds. We saw lots of egrets and herons and some ducks and birds we could not identify but must importantly we saw severable trumpeter swans with their signets. What pretty birds and they are big.

From Cleveland we drove south along the Ohio & Erie Canalway. This canal was built between 1825 and 1832 to reduce the amount of time it took to move grain and other goods from the midwest to New York. It reduced the time from 30 to 10 days. The canal was short lived because the railroads became a better way to move product. The tow paths from which the mules used to pull the tow boats are now hiking and biking trails. The drive along the canal is through a

heavy mixed hardwood area.

Highlight for us was a farmers stand set up as sort of a fair. With a great variety of fruits, vegetables, pumpkins and gourds very colorfully displayed. They had live music, a corn maze, and were selling various food items and drinks. We of course had to have the roasted sweet corn. The corn was taken right from the wagon that was bringing it in from the field. Talk about fresh sweet corn.

The next day found us visiting one of Carol's cousins. Her and her husband just got tired of the hustle of Chicago living and decided they needed a different pace. They found it in the lovely hills of Ohio. They have adjusted well to rural living. In fact they both have won prizes at their local county fair. Cheryl for her baking and Rick for his peppers. It was fun visiting and catching up with them since we have not seen them for many years.

Since Ohio has the highest Amish population in the United States. We decided to check things and get some first hand knowledge about the Amish.

We toured an Amish farm and rode in an Amish buggy. Basically we learned that there are two different Amish orders, one stricter than the other. An Amish church has a membership of about 25 to 35 families. Church services are held bi weekly in a families home. The benches and other items needed for the service and lunch are hauled in the church wagon from home to home. The service consists of a hymn lasting 20 to 25 minutes. Reading from the Bible. (this is done by the Bishop) and two men deliver a sermon. Each sermon is about an hour long. So service is about three hours. After church there is a lunch served. Church wagon is

packed up and the next family to host the services takes the wagon home.

Members are not Baptized until they are ready to get married. Children usually go to school until the 8th grade and then their work life begins.

They believe in a simple life and the general rule is if your father didn't have it than there is no need for it.

We enjoyed the food and the baked goods are outstanding. The whole area is picture book perfect.

After leaving the Canton area of Ohio we headed to Warren, Pennsylvania to pick up the Timber, Oil and Coal Country Drive. One can not describe the beauty that the eye beholds as one travels through the Alleghenies. The leaves are just starting to turn. One sees golds, yellows, oranges, greens, browns, reds and flowers of all different colors along side the roadway. Vistas of dams and gorges. Oh what a beautiful country we live in and what an awesome GOD we have that made all of this for us to enjoy.

Next stop for us was Corning New York. Where we visited the Corning Glass Museum. It is hard to believe what can be done with glass. It is amazing what pieces of art can be created by using glass. This is a must stop if you are ever in this part of New York State. We also toured the Rockwell Museum in Corning.

We took a six day break in our travels and spent six days with Joe's sister who lives in Spencer New York. A small town in the finger lake area. An area of great vistas, and best of all lots of vineyards and they all have tasting rooms.

Sunday saw us at Trinity Lutheran Church, a small but very active congregation of about 100 members. We felt very much at home. People were friendly and best of all the service was conducted in our worship style.

Tuesday found us on the road again traveling along the Erie Canal and the Mohawk River Valley. We past many a town that we would have liked to stop and explore but rain put a little damper on things.

Once we crossed the Hudson River into Northwest Massachusetts we noticed a change in the terrain. Sometimes we were driving in the clouds and sometimes there were clouds below us. The views were great and we wondered how much better they would be if it was a sunny day. Since most of our driving is on back roads we pass many farm stands selling apples, pumpkins and maple syrup.

The towns and villages that we pass through reminded us of times gone by. One of the towns converted one of their bridges too narrow for current traffic into a flower bridge for pedestrian traffic.

In Vermont we visited museums with Grandma Moses pictures and Norman Rockwell illustrations. We saw a state park that was once a white marble quarry and many covered bridges. We even drove through a covered bridge. Of course one has to visit Ben and Jerry Ice Cream and Cabot Cheese.

Learned today that when Cabot makes their cheddar all the sugar from the milk is removed. So all of you that are lactose intolerant can have Cabot's cheddar. By the way, there is no difference in the cheese from mild to extreme

sharpness except for age. Also there is no difference between yellow and white cheddar except food coloring. Colby and Monterey are the same except for the color. Our friends, those are the cheesy facts.

A trip to New England is not complete unless one goes to the top of Mount Washington, the tallest peak on the east coast. The peak, because of it's location, also has some of the most extreme weather conditions on earth. On a clear day one could not ask for a more awesome vista to behold. We were at the summit for about an hour. Temp was 24 degrees and with a wind chill of 5 degrees. We went from bright sunshine to fog and back again to bright sunshine.

Our next two days in New Hampshire consisted of taking two science train rides through valleys, around gorges and mountains. The fall colors are just about peak. it amazes Carol and I that anyone could believe this all came about by accident.






