



When It's Hard to Give Thanks

As I write the lead for the November newsletter, it is Tuesday, October 15, 2024. Our newsletter editor is always pleased when all the articles due are submitted by the 18th of each month.

Having two major hurricanes affect our area within 3 weeks of each other, and since this article is for November where many people focus on the things for which to give thanks, it seems obvious that the focus would be on thanking God for His protection and provision during the last two hurricanes.

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But not everyone may be so willing to do so, especially if someone close to them died as a result of Helene or Milton. There are those who not only do not want to thank God, but perhaps are experiencing intense anger for what is perceived as a lack of protection and provision. God where are you? God why did you let this happen? Don't you love me? Are you punishing me?

As believers we too struggle with these questions regarding our loving God. But the answer should not be focused on God, but on us and our understanding of the God we follow and worship.

Why do we assume that as followers of God, our lives will be without problem, or at least with minimal problems, or again with problems that have quick and easy solutions? Why do we forget these passages?

1 Peter 5:10

¹⁰ And the God of all grace, who called you to his eternal glory in Christ, after you have suffered a little while, will himself restore you and make you strong, firm and steadfast.

Pain is part of the process of growth. None of us remember the pain of our first teeth coming in. But our parents do. Indeed, there was a lot of pain. But it was necessary in order for us to grow stronger. The pain process of tooth eruption allowed us to go from liquid mush type foods to foods that we could sink our teeth into. Couple that with a growing appetite and we grew stronger as we aged.

Pain discourages us. It can make us feel worried, anxious or even angry. But remember this:

Romans 8:28

²⁸ And we know that in all things God works for the good of those who love him, who have been called according to his purpose.

Romans 5:3-5

³ Not only so, but we also glory in our sufferings, because we know that suffering produces perseverance; ⁴ perseverance, character; and character, hope. ⁵ And hope does not put us to shame, because God's love has been poured out into our hearts through the Holy Spirit, who has been given to us.

God will use all things, even difficulty, even struggles, even pain in order to develop our spiritual maturity.

People want mountain top experiences, emotional and spiritual highs. They make us feel good. But we can't get from mountain top to mountain top without going through the valleys. And that is what makes those mountain top experiences so joyful. It's because we have left the valley and began the hard, demanding climb up the mountain.

These two recent back to back hurricanes have reminded me that there are others around me who had a much more difficult time with these storms than I did. And not all of them understand God the way I do. They are struggling. They are angry. They may even walk away from the God they have worshipped for years.

What can we as believers and disciples continue to do in the recovery, especially for those who don't believe, but also for the current believer who is struggling, trying to understand God and make sense of it all?

What do we do? We love. With our words. With our actions. But also by our quiet presence, just sitting with them and holding their hands.

The consequences of shallow thankfulness

Can you imagine a Thanksgiving dinner without turkey, mashed potatoes, gravy and pump-kin pie? I know I can't! To not have these on the menu, or worse, to run out of them with the family around the table, would be a culinary sin of epic proportions. An attempt to serve bratwurst and hamburgers in place of the standard fare would ring hollow and seem totally inappropriate and out of place. It isn't that the food would be bad; brats and burgers are pretty tasty. But not for Thanksgiving — they just don't go together!

This month, as we continue to walk through the stewardship hymn, "Forgive Us, Lord, for Shallow Thankfulness" (*LSB* 788), we turn our attention to verse three. Here, William Watkins Reid, Sr., the man who penned this text, draws attention to some things that do not go along with faithful, thankful stewardship.

Forgive us, Lord, for selfish thanks and praise ...

We see this often with small children. They greedily snatch the candy out of a grandparent's hand, savagely destroy the wrapper, and attempt to stuff the entire delicacy in their mouth in one bite, only to have a parent say, "Tell grandma thank you." This is followed by the pro forma thanks that is uttered between chocolate chews. It isn't really thankfulness; it is simply checking a box to keep mom or dad off their backs.

We never really outgrow this either. Our shallow thankfulness takes the form of feigned humility when praise is being offered. We are thankful that our admirers noticed and called us out: "Look at me! Aren't I special?" No thought at all is given to the fact that the Lord was the One who gave us the ability and opportunity for accomplishment. Our false blush is really only masking our selfish, credit-seeking gain. Once again, we find ourselves idolatrously thanking ourselves.

For words that speak at variance with deeds ...

What carries more weight: words or action? The steward who gives voice to the Gospel in the Divine Service but then lives like a pagan in the world does great damage, not only to others but to the Gospel itself! This is the consequence of failed stewardship. It is idolatry that separates the steward from the Lord.

Worse yet, it also impacts others negatively. When the failed steward is the reference point outside the Christian community, there are those who want no part of being Christian or following the Christ they claim. We see this play out in the impact of overt political activity among Christians based on governing policy as opposed to fidelity to the Word of God. When our lips and our lives are out of sync, like what used to happen with old movie projectors, the impact isn't funny — it obscures the Gospel!

Forgive our thanks for walking pleasant ways unmindful of a broken brother's need ...

Our creature comforts often become an obstacle to faithful stewardship. This is true of both

individual and corporate stewardship. Financial stewardship is often limited by our desire to be comfortable and have the latest toys and gadgets. Congregational stewardship is often limited by the desire to focus on what is best for the congregation as opposed to how resources might be best stewarded to reach the community with the Gospel.

When we see someone in need, or broken by the world, we often look at them as freeloaders. We admonish them to get a job. We insist that they learn our language, learn our customs, and make them their own. But this gets in the way of seeing every human being the way that Jesus sees them. Remember, that broken person is one for whom Jesus went to the cross to die and rise. When we are unmindful of these needs, our shallow thankfulness also stands in the way of the Gospel.

This stanza reminds us of the challenge we face. Our hearts are master idol-makers. Our shallow thankfulness threatens our souls and hinders others from seeing Jesus as their Lord and Savior. Stewardship is serious business. It is a task for which we were created. In our sinful failings, we are never relieved of these duties. In our Baptism, we are restored to be stewards of the Gospel. Our faithful stewardship is all about that Gospel.

Forgive us when our thanks are shallow, O Lord! In this month of Thanksgiving, grant us the grace to offer heaping helpings of this stewardship so that others may see Jesus!



- **K-1** Kindergarten and 1st grade have completed their first semester. They have been working on building their social and emotional skills by daily circle time where they can openly discuss their thoughts. During their academic time we have been working on a variety of skills like patterning, adding and subtracting, sight words and reading comprehension. During our Bible class they have been learning about Joseph in the book of Genesis and how he forgave his brothers for their jealousy. We look forward to teaching them about Moses during the weeks to come. Ms. Pam and Ms. Lacey
- 2nd & 3rd The Second and Third graders are continuing to benefit from the spiral design of basic math skills in the Abeka curriculum. Our daily practice of such skills as borrowing and carrying for addition and subtraction, telling time to the minute, geometry, measurement, solving story problems and place value strengthens higher level thinking. The Second graders are learning multiplication facts as they listen to the Third graders practice 2s, 3s and 4s times tables to the tunes of Twinkle, Twinkle, Little Star, Freres Jacques and Row Row Row Your Boat. Our class has targeted discussions about how we treat one another. When unkind words or deeds occur, we have begun to consider how God wants us to use what we write and say to encourage others. - 4th & 5th We have completed Genesis Chapters 1-8. Our students have memorized Psalm 23 and are now reading Genesis Chapters 9-11 and memorizing I Corinthians 13:1-7. The students already call it the love chapter. In Arithmetic 4th grade is conquering division problems and unknown number solutions. Multiplication will always be in review. In Language, students are learning past, present and future tense for helping and action verbs in sentences. Spelling has a new challenge with an online game called spelling training.com. This has helped them enjoy learning 20 words and 10 vocabulary words a week. Reading for Fourth Grade is practicing reading aloud like you are talking instead of like a robot. They seem to enjoy using more expressions in their oral readings. Fifth grade is reading a chapter book with deep convictions. Discussions from each chapter are pricking their consciences and helping them make decisions based on God's word not being pressured by others. Science has been fun with my science experiments. Some work, some don't. But we are learning pitch and volume with sounds. Hopefully, they understand that being too loud hurts their ears from the vibrations of sound. History has been about ancient civilizations for 5th grade and 4th grade is learning how our 13 colonies organized a government to rule themselves. Penmanship is slower than I expected. Many new students have never been exposed to it. But they are taking on the challenge with better results every day. Please keep our students in prayer while they repair their homes after these hurricanes. Some have had to be displaced while they are being restored. Ms. Fran
- 6th & 7th Hello all, the past month has been a busy one. In class they have been working on, in 6th for Math they've almost completed fractions and decimals. In 7th they have been working on finding Percentages and finding out how to calculate how much do they save with coupons. In Bible both classes have been working on The Exodus out of Egypt led by Moses. And the Israelites passage through the desert. In Language both classes have been working on descriptive stories and paragraphs. In Science they have been studying the Solar System and observing

the Harvest Moon and the Comet that only comes by every 18,000 years. In History 6th and &7th grade has been learning about Plymouth Plantations and the first Thanksgiving.
