"JESUS GAVE GIFTS TO HIS CHURCH"

October is recognized as Pastor Appreciation month. And so, I will just say it, "Pastors are gifts from God." You might think me arrogant for saying that since I am a Pastor. It is sort of like a nurse saving nurses are gifts from God or a teacher saying the same thing, but wait, haven't we all received nursing care to bind up and heal our wounds or found the wonder of learning through the guidance of a good teacher? They are gifts of God for what they do for us. Well then, so are Pastors. I say this not of me personally, but of the work that God works through me and all those set apart by the laying on of hands, prayer, and the Word of God. God gave gifts to His Church, says St. Paul in Ephesians (4:11), and among them is the gift of Pastors. Pastors are gifts from God because of what God does through them.

To be clear, I do not say this to bring honor to myself or to elevate myself above others. In fact, it is humbling to say this. The Office of Pastor is a gift of God to His Church. Humble and unworthy men, like me, are set apart by God through the Church for this great office. The honor flows not from the man to the office but from the office to the man. Sometimes Pastors forget that. When they do, they need to be reminded who's Office they have been called to serve.

I am reminded of a Pastor named

Timothy of whom St. Paul reminds of the good confession of faith he made within the assembly. But we could just as easily point to Ezra who brought the Torah, or the chief Pastor of the Church, Jesus, who stood in the synagogue and proclaimed the Word of the Lord. Pastors are gifts of God to His Church who serve Him by the proclamation of the Word of God and by the service of His Sacraments to His people.


The Pastoral Office was not invented by the Church but is Christ's institution and His gift to the Church. No Pastor acts on His own but in the person of Christ through the means of grace. No congregation is free to reject the Office. Pastors and congregations do not compete against one another, but work together - in different fields and venues, with different calls and services, but in partnership, observing and fulfilling Christ's mission: to go make disciples. The Pastor brings Christ to the congregation and the congregation brings Christ to the world.

Although we talk a lot about congregations calling Pastors, in truth, God calls Pastors. It is a divine call which the Church confirms. The Church discerns God's calling and prayerfully confirms or denies this divine call. This is not some fine distinction but essential to the office. Pastors serve congregations but they

STEWARDSHIP

Giving is a spiritual issue. The Scriptures are replete with how giving and believing go hand in hand, that our trust and faith in God are commensurate with our giving. In 2013, the Religion News Service reported that the average annual percentage of income given to the church had fallen percent to 2.3 (http:// www.religionnews.com/2013/10/24/report-churchgiving-reaches-depression-era-record-lows/). what does this confess about our trust in the God who has given us all that we need for body and soul, not sparing His own Son into death so that we would not die but live? What does this say about our faith, when even the Jew gave at least ten percent, while we, having received the fullness of God's generosity barely give one fifth of that?

storehouse, that there may be food in my house. And thereby put me to the test, says the Lord of hosts, if I will not open the windows of heaven for you and pour down for you a blessing until there is no more need" (Mal 3:7b–10).

Do not these words even cut us to the heart? Are they not true for us even as they were for them? Are we not now reaping what we have sown in faith? We have sown little, we have sown sparingly, and so is our harvest. But what if we were to take the Lord at His word? What if we, like them, were to put Him to the test and give to support the work of the church as our generous God has given all things to us? Would not the storehouses burst open? Would not the windows of heaven pour out blessing upon His church so that they could be a blessing and a light to the world?

Return to me, and I will return to you, says the Lord of hosts.

Meanwhile, churches and schools fall into disrepair or close their doors because of lack of funding; pastors and teachers live at or under the poverty level; and the State replaces the Church as the source for care of the widow, the fatherless, and the poor. Something is wrong with this. Though we have received generously from our generous God, we have not given in like manner. How can this be? How can we, as Christians and especially as Lutherans, who stake everything on that most beautiful doctrine of justification—that God, out of His divine goodness and mercy, has saved us by grace through faith on account of Christ's death and resurrection without works of the law—not help but give of our income just as generously? How can we who have received so much give so little?

It is a shame, and we need to repent. As the Lord spoke through prophet Malachi, "Return to me, and I will return to you, says the Lord of hosts. But you say, 'How shall we return?' Will man rob God? Yet you are robbing me. But you say, 'How have we robbed you?' In your tithes and contributions. You are cursed with a curse, for you are robbing me, the whole nation of you. Bring the full tithe into the

Imagine it.

But doing it takes faith. It takes trust that the Lord will be faithful just as He promised. For if God has given you His own Son, will He not give you all things? Yes, He will. This is His sure and certain promise. God provides for His people. He provides everything we need for this body and life and for the life that is to come

Christ's merits have set us free from the tithe. Giving is no longer something we have to do. It is what we do because of what God has first done for us. We give not because we must in order to keep the law. We give as a response of faith, a confession of faith in deed about what God has done and continues to do for us. For in Christ, we are freed from the tithe, freed that our giving is not out of compulsion or reluctance but generously from a cheerful heart and a life richly lived in the forgiveness of all our sins and for the good and blessing of those around us. And a life so lived enriches us all with blessing until there is no more need and thanksgivings to the One who promised to make it happen.

are ultimately accountable to God. That is a statement which ought to stir up some fear in the hearts of those who would be Pastors – I know it frightens me.

The ancient custom of bringing the casket into the church feet first so that the

Christian may rise up to meet Christ is reversed for Pastors. They are brought in head first for they must first account for their stewardship of the ministry of Word and Sacrament to God's people. This is a stewardship of which I fail miserably. Why? Because I am a sinner.

We often talk of ministry in many ways as if it were merely something we want to do for God or something we like doing for God. Ministry with a capital "M" is the Ministry – the ministry of the means of grace. Our Lutheran Confessions define the Ministry as God working His work of grace and mercy, Law and Gospel, through the means of grace – the Word and the Sacraments. These are not the Pastor's tools like a carpenters tools. These are the means God has chosen through which He is present among us to call, gather, enlighten and sanctify His Church. The Gospel is not what you build with the Word and Sacraments, the Word and Sacraments are the Gospel.

The authority of this Office, indeed its power, is the Word of God. It is not constitution or by-law that gives the Pastoral Office its authority but the Word preached and taught. In Ephesians 4, Paul says "Pastors and teachers" but this is not the "and" that connects two different things; it is the "and" that connects two facets of the very same Office. Preaching and teaching are not essentially different things but the same. Preaching and teaching are the arenas in which the authority of the Word is brought to God's people so that it may accomplish God's purpose and not return empty to Him.

The domain of the Office is the Word of God. Pastors do a ton of things that have little to do with God's Word and I suppose that is not so bad unless it gives the Pastor and his people the idea that the Word is not the central arena in which He works. The place or arena for the Pastor's service is Word.

But it is not only the Word in the sense of the written Word. It is equally the visible Word of the water of baptism, the oral Word in the voice of absolution, and the visible Word of bread and wine that is Christ's Body and Blood. The sacraments are not like add-ons to the Office of the Ministry or to the Church but part and parcel of the Office and of the life of the Church. Fingers, a heart and lungs are members of the body but you can get along without fingers. You cannot get along without a heart and lungs. The Word proclaimed and visible in the Sacraments are the heart and lungs of the Church. These are the essential focus and purpose of the Pastor's Ministry.

The mark of a Pastor's success is usually seen in nickels and noses, that is, how much money comes in the plate and how many people sit in the pews. Sadly, too many Pastors have been driven by this gauge of success to the point that they will do just about anything to improve the numbers. But the mark of a Pastor's success is ultimately His faithfulness to God's Word. Earthly esteem and respect are nice but some of the greatest Pastors of the Church were persecuted for the sake of the Gospel and lived a life filled with trouble because they were faithful to God's calling. They were great because they were faithful to God's Word. The earthly success may or may not tally up numbers of nickels and noses but God's barometer of success is faithfulness.

I am a pastor today because of God's faithfulness to me. In part, I am also a pastor today because of the faithful Pastors who washed me in the water of holy baptism, who absolved and still absolve me of my sin, who catechized me in the Word and in the faith and still teach me, who fed me the Body and Blood of Christ so that I might feed others the heavenly food of His Holy Supper. But more than this, they, faithful pastors past and present, raised up the Pastoral Ministry as a noble Office and they honored Christian service as the highest of callings. So in humility and weakness I vow to you today to do for you, what these Pastors did for me: preach, teach, and administer the Sacraments.

But I beg of you to do a few of things. First, pray for me and for my faithfulness to God's Word and in this Office committed to me in my ordination vows. Second, hear me with the informed and discerning ear of those who know God's Word and can recognize when the Gospel is spoken truly and faithfully and correct me when it is not. Third, give attention to the voice of Christ that speaks through the Word and Sacraments, not as obedience rendered to me but, as the response of faith to the voice of God and His sacraments.

And also one more thing, I must beg of you to honor the Office of Pastor among you – not for my benefit but for those young boys and men who sit among us, whom God may and will call to serve in this Office. Honor the Office of Pastor and encourage these boys and men to aspire to this Office, to listen for the voice of God calling and to submit to the wisdom of the Church in confirming that call.

Honor the Office of Pastor not for me but for those whom God raise up and work through when this generation is gone and there are still people who need to hear the Gospel proclaimed, who need to be taught the faith, who need the cleansing touch of baptismal water, who need to hear the consoling voice of absolution, and who need to receive the Body and Blood of Christ to nourish them in grace in both body and soul. Honor the Office and encourage those who aspire to it and there will always be faithful Pastors through whom God works in His Church.

Pastors are gifts of God to His Church, not because they are special or wonderful but because the Lord works through them to bring to you the Jesus who is present with His grace and mercy in His Word and Sacraments and thus equip you to fulfill your baptismal vocation to bring Christ Jesus to the world.

As your pastor, I do not expect any special recognition during the month of October or any other month for that matter. Serving you, as a member of Christ's Church, is honor enough.





FROM THE ELDERS...

The Board of Elders encourage the congregation to study the role of the doctrine of the church and the application of the office of the keys in our congregation. The church receives the power of the office of the keys from Christ, which is then conferred upon the called pastor to be exercised publicly on behalf of the congregation. These writings emphasize these concepts and are based in Scripture and have been accepted by the Lutheran Church – Missouri Synod.

From: A Brief Statement of the Doctrinal Position of the Missouri Synod (1897) by Franz Pieper

Of the Church

We believe one holy Christian church on earth, of which Christ is the Head and which Christ gathers through the Gospel, keeps and rules.

The members of this church are Christians, that is, people, but also only the people, who have despaired of their own righteousness before God and believe, that God forgives [their] sins for Christ's sake. Concerning this church, which is the invisible fellowship of all believers (Luke 17:20, 21), we teach, that it is found not only in outward church fellowships that teach God's Word purely on every matter, but also elsewhere where so much is available of the Word of God besides errors, that people are able to come to a knowledge of their sins and to faith in the forgiveness of sins for Christ's sake.

Although through God's great grace children of God are found also in heterodox church fellowships, heterodox church fellowships are not willed by God, but earnestly forbidden, for God wills that His Word will be purely taught and believed on every matter, as it is written (1 Peter 4:11): "if anyone speaks, let him speak it as God's Word." That is why it is God's will that all Christians only adhere to orthodox church fellowships, and that the Christian, who has strayed into heterodox church fellowships, leave them and seek the fellowship of the orthodox church, as it is written (Romans 16:17): "I urge you, beloved Brethren, that you take note of those who cause division and offense apart from the doctrine that you have learned and go away from them!" Unionism, that is, fellowship with false doctrine, we reject as disobedience against God's Word and as [a] standing threat to lose God's Word completely.

Because only Christians are the church, it is self-evident that only they, then, are the actual and original possessors of all spiritual goods and rights, which Christ has acquired and given as St. Paul reminds believers: "All is yours" (1 Corinthians 3:21) and as Christ Himself awards all believers the keys of the Kingdom of Heaven (Matthew 16:13-19; 18:17-20; John 20:22, 23) and charges all believers with the preaching of the Gospel and with the administration of the sacraments (Matthew 28:19, 20; 1 Cor. 11:23-25). Therefore, we reject all doctrines, through which this authority or a portion thereof was originally ascribed to individual persons such as the pope or bishops, the order of pastors, the earthly prince, councils, or synods, etc.

The administration of public offices in the church through individual persons comes lawfully through transmission brought about on the part of the original possessors and remains under their supervision (Col. 4:17). All Christians also naturally have the right and duty to judge doctrine, admittedly not according to their own opinions but according to God's Word (1 Peter 4:11).

Of the Preaching Office

Concerning the preaching office we teach that it is a divine order, that is, Christians should keep places [where] the Word of God [is] in use not only each one for himself and in the family circle, but according to divine order they are also responsible to ensure that God's Word is publicly preached among them by persons qualified for this work and the sacraments are administered according to Christ's institution (Titus 1:5; Acts 14:23; 2 Timothy 2:2).

However, the preaching office has no other authority than the authority of the Word of God (1 Peter 4:11), that is, Christians owe unconditional obedience to the preaching office if and whenever the preacher proclaims the Word of God to them (Hebrews 13:17; Luke 10:16). However if a preacher goes beyond God's Word in his doctrine and field, then Christians do not owe obedience but disobedience in order to remain true to Christ, according to the Words of Christ: "One is your Master, the Christ and you are all brethren" (Matthew 23:8). Therefore, we reject wholeheartedly the false doctrine whereby power in matters that Christ has not commanded is ascribed to the preaching office, to put a yoke on the necks of the disciples.

Attention may be directed to the fact that also Luther . . . at times speaks of ministers, that is, of those "who serve in ecclesiastical offices" (St. L., X, 423 ff.), as "priests," "spirituals", a "spiritual estate", etc. He declares, however, that the use of these terms is not only without foundation in Scripture, but also misleading, since according to Holy Scripture all believers are "anointed," 1 John 2, 27, "spiritual," Gal. 6:1, a "spiritual house" and a "spiritual priesthood," 1 Pet. 2:5, 9. (Cf. Hutterus Redivivus, p. 270.)

Luther furthermore declares that the Holy Spirit in the New Testament carefully avoids the application of the name priest (sacerdos) to the apostles or their colaborers, while He distinctly applies that term to all baptized Christians. He says (St. L., XIX, 1260): "We are not born [again] in Baptism as apostles, teachers, preachers, pastors, but as priests. Then the Church takes one of these regenerate priests and calls and elects him to such functions as all believers should execute because of their [priestly] office." Luther thus rejects the erroneous opinion that ministers, or pastors, constitute a "spiritual estate."

Luther's position is in strict conformity with the teaching of Holy Scripture; for Scripture describes the elders and bishops not as "spiritual" in preference to others, but as ministers (servants) of the believers, 2 Cor. 4, 5. It is true, all pastors are also servants of Christ and of God (1 Cor. 4:1; Titus 1:7; 2 Tim. 2:24; Luke 12:42) but they are such only as ministers of the Church or because the Church has called them to be "ministers of Christ and stewards of the mysteries of God."

Of this Luther writes (St. L., X, 1590): "Paul calls himself a servant, and more than once he says: I serve in the Gospel. This he does not in order that he may establish an estate or order, a right or a certain dignity, as people today would do, but that he might alone praise the office and work and preserve the right and dignity of the priesthood in the congregation."

Similarly Dr. Walther says (Kirche und Amt, p. 221): "The public ministry is not a special estate, which exists in contra-distinction to the common state of Christians or is holier than it, but it is a **ministry of service**."

For this reason the churches have also the right and the duty to watch over the ministry of their pastors and teachers, Col. 4, 17, and to dismiss them in case they refuse to preach the Word of God in its truth and purity and to adorn it with a holy life, Col. 4:17; John 10:5; Matt. 7:15; Rom. 16:17, 18. (Cp. Luther, St. L., X, 1591.)

Ministers, of course, hold their office only so long as they administer the functions of the public ministry which they have received through the call.

When describing the manner in which called ministers receive their divine office from the congregation, our dogmaticians have used the verb **confer**. They said: "Through the call the Christian congregation confers the public ministry upon qualified persons."

This term should not be condemned as objectionable; for it expresses the Scriptural truth that the congregation is the "fountain of all church power" (Hase: "der Quell aller Kirchengewalt") by virtue of the Office of the Keys which Christ has given to His Church, and that pastors exercise the public ministry only in the name and by the authority of the congregation. Those who object to the term have reason to examine themselves whether they fully agree with the Scriptural doctrine of the Office of the Keys. (Cp. Christl. DogmatiJc, III, 522 ff.)

With respect to the power which Christian pastors possess by virtue of their call our dogmaticians rightly say that all power which they have as ministers is conferred upon, or delegated to, them by the congregation, so that their jurisdiction is limited by the call.

The power of the ministry embraces a) the power of preaching the Gospel and administering the Sacraments and b) that of remitting and retaining sins.

The power of excommunication, commonly called the ban, the pastor must never administer without the congregation, Matt. 18:17, 18; 1 Cor. 5:13. It is properly the function of the pastor rightly to guide the congregation in judging each case and, if the sinner under discipline is found to be impenitent, to publish and declare publicly as a servant of the church what the congregation has decided to do, 1 Cor:5, 1 — 7, 13.

Again, if the sinner repents, it is the duty of the pastor to urge the congregation to forgive him, 2 Cor. 2:6 — 11, and then to publish, or declare publicly, the absolution of the congregation. A ban which a minister executes contrary to God's Word and without the congregation Luther calls a "lying ban" (Luegenbann). (Cp. St. L., XIX, 950 ff.)

8. THE POWER OF THE PUBLIC MINISTRY.

Since the pastoral office is the ministry of the divine Word, all believers are in duty bound **to obey their pastors just as they obey God Himself**, Heb. 13:17; Luke 10:16. As long therefore as pastors are true ministers of the Word, their authority is as great as that of the divine Word. However, as soon as they go beyond God's Word and teach commandments of men, they have no authority at all, and their hearers must refuse them obedience for conscience' sake, Matt. 23:8; Rom. 16:17.

Adiaphora, that is, matters which are neither commanded nor forbidden by God's Word, should not be adjudged by the minister, but by the entire congregation by common consent.

Against the claim of the papists that laymen must obey their priests in all things, the Apology correctly declares (Art. XXVIII, 19. 20): "He that heareth you heareth Me, Luke 10:16, cannot be understood of traditions. For Christ requires that they teach in such a way that (by their mouth) He Himself be heard, because He says: 'He heareth Me/ Therefore He wishes His own voice, His own Word, to be heard, not human traditions. Thus a saying which is most especially in our favor and contains the most important consolation and doctrine these stupid men pervert to the most trifling matters, the distinction of food, vestments, and the like. They quote Heb. 13:17: 'Obey them that have the rule over you/ This passage requires obedience to the Gospel. For it does not establish a dominion for the bishops apart from the Gospel. Neither should the bishops frame traditions contrary to the Gospel or interpret their traditions contrary to the Gospel. And when they do this, obedience is prohibited, according to Gal. 1:9: If any man preach any other gospel, let him be accursed"

The minister therefore has no power or jurisdiction whatever outside his call and office. His authority is limited to the Office of the Keys (Schluesselgewalt).

Many references in Scripture which come to mind that can apply to pastor and people of a Christian congregation -- these are not part of the above articles but convey a Biblical attitude we are to have.

- a) 1 Corinthians 4: 1. So then, men ought to regard us as servants of Christ and as those entrusted with the secret things of God.
- b) 1 Cor 8: 12. When you sin against your brothers in this way and wound their weak conscience, you sin against Christ. 13. Therefore, if what I eat causes my brother to fall into sin, I will never eat meat again, so that I will not cause him to fall.
- c) 1 Cor 9: 9. Though I am <u>free</u> and belong to no man, <u>I make myself a slave to everyone</u>, to win as many as possible........22. To the weak I became weak, to win the weak. I have become all things to all men so that by all possible means I might save some. 23. I do all this for the sake of the gospel, that I may share in its blessings.
- d) 1 Cor 10: 23. "Everything is permissible"--but not everything is beneficial. "Everything is permissible"--but not everything is constructive. 24. Nobody should seek his own good, but the good of others...... 31. So whether you eat or drink or whatever you do, do it all for the glory of God. 32. Do not cause anyone to stumble, whether Jews, Greeks or the church of God-- 33. even as I try to please everybody in every way. For I am not seeking my own good but the good of many, so that they may be saved.
- e) 1 Cor 12:20. As it is, there are many parts, but one body. 21. The eye cannot say to the hand, "I don't need you!" And the head cannot say to the feet, "I don't need you!", 25. so that there should be no division in the body, but that its parts should have equal concern for each other. 26. If one part suffers, every part suffers with it; if one part is honored, every part rejoices with it.
- f) 2 Cor 5: 14. For Christ's love compels us
- g) 1 Cor 14: 3. <u>Do nothing out of selfish ambition or vain conceit, but in humility consider others better than yourselves.</u> 4. 

TUESDAY MORNING BIBLE CLASS

WHERE HAVE THEY COME? WHERE ARE THEY NOW? WHERE ARE THEY HEADED?

Tuesday morning Bible Class will soon begin **October 14**th with another exciting and relevant topic of study: "Where Have They Come? Where Are They Now? Where Are They Headed?" Who are 'They'? They are the religion of Islam, that is, the Muslims. You may have first come to know Al-Qaeda in 2001, but lately you have been hearing more and more about Islamist groups like ISIS, Hamas, Boko Haram, the Muslim Brotherhood, Hezbollah, etc., in the news – and it's not very good news. So, have you ever wondered when and where have they come? How they became so popular? Or where they may be headed? These will be some of the questions we will review in our study. In doing so, we will also review what they believe and teach and how their beliefs and teachings differ from Holy Scripture. If you are as uneducated as I am about these Islamic Extremists then this is a class to learn a lot about this ever growing, threatening, terrorist religious group.

Dr. Martin Luther summarized what he considered to be the essence of Islam. He concluded that Muslims were destroyers, enemies, and blasphemers of our Lord Jesus Christ, men who instead of the gospel and faith set up their shameful Muhammad and all kinds of lies, ruining all temporal government and home life or marriage.

We must not underestimate or misunderstand what we now face today. Make no mistake, Islam is expanding, even our own land. While much of its growth is due to high birth rates and immigration, conversions are occurring as well. The reasons behind this phenomenon are plentiful. The best we can do to defend ourselves



is by, one, exposing the errors of Islam and, two, rigorously defending the truth of Christianity. Luther himself expressed this in his preface to the 1543 edition of the Quran:

"All this should not be thought of lightly especially by those of us who teach in the church. We ought to fight everywhere with the armies of the devil. How many varieties of enemies have we seen in this age of ours? ... We must prepare ourselves now against Muhammad. But what are we able to say about things of which we are ignorant? Hence, it is useful for those who are experienced to read the scriptures of the enemy in order to accurately refute, damage, and destroy them so that they might be capable to correct anyone, or surely to strengthen our people with solid arguments."

We will once again use GOOD NEWS magazine as our guide to hear




