"WHAT HAVE YOU COME OUT TO SEE?"

e would all agree that cancer – cancer of any kind – is no friend of ours. Recently I found out a very good friend of mine was diagnosed with prostate cancer. As many of you know, before treatment can take place, the doctor and patient, as well as the patient's family, have to determine what kind of treatment to undertake to battle the cancer.

Now, depending on the situation and the patient's circumstances, the treatment options for men with prostate cancer might include: Surgery, Radiation, Chemotherapy, Hormone therapy, Cryosurgery, or treatment. Vaccine These treatments are generally used one at a time, although in some cases they may be combined. Nevertheless, treatment against this incurable and deadly disease is needed.

I am also certain that before my friend and his wife make the decision, regarding what kind of treatment to receive, they will undoubtedly seek guidance and wisdom from God through His Word and prayer.

I took the title, "What Have You Come Out to See," from an article the Thursday Morning Ladies Bible Class recently studied in Good News Magazine - God's Healing Medicine for You. The words come from the Lord Jesus Himself speaking to the crowds concerning John the Baptist saying, "What did you go out into the wilderness to see? A reed shaken by the wind? What then did you go out to see? A man dressed in soft clothing? ... What then did you go out to see?" (Luke 7:24-26).

The author of this particular article posed this question to the reader. Suppose Jesus were to make Himself physically visible at your church door next Sunday morning as you entered, and what if Jesus were to ask you, "What have you come to church today to hear, or to receive?" How would you answer His question?

For many who come to Redeemer, I am confident they would respond just as the Ladies did in Bible Class: to receive His Word and His Sacrament; to be forgiven and; to know that Jesus loves me.

Unfortunately, many members of our congregation would not be able to answer Jesus' question because they are not

attending Divine Service faithfully to even hear the question from Jesus.

I realize my last sentence is a very condemning statement. However, let me remind each and every one of you (including myself), that we have ALL been diagnosed with an incurable, deadly disease. The incurable disease is sin (Psalm 51:5; Romans 3:23), which we inherited from our first parents (Adam and Eve). There is no remedy that man can provide in order to remove or cure this deadly disease. Because of sin, both original and actual, we are utterly condemned. Therefore we cry out like the Apostle Paul, "Who can save me from this body of death?" (Romans 7:24). The answer to the question, of course, is lesus.

Just like the cancer patient in need of treatment for his incurable disease, so are we in need of treatment for our incurable disease. The cancer patient goes to the doctor each week to hear the status of his affliction and to receive the treatment for his disease, so do we need to go to Church to hear of our affliction and to receive treatment from our Divine Physician.

So, go to church. Go to church where Jesus will give you His treatment for your spiritual cancer, a treatment which will assure you that the spiritual cancer you have been diagnosed can never, ever destroy your faith in Jesus.

On February 10th we enter into the penitential season of Lent with Ash Wednesday. Divine Service will be offered at 4:30 & 7:00 PM with the Imposition of Ashes (BTW: Divine Service indicates the celebration of Holy Communion). There will also be a Lenten Dinner provided in Fellowship Hall between services, which will be approximately 5:30 PM. Please look for the signup sheet in the narthex on the visitors' desk.

Choir will continue to practice at 6:00 PM on Wednesday. They are preparing to sing beautiful anthems during the Lenten season as well as Easter. If you are interested in singing with the choir during this time, please come to choir practice held in the choir room behind the sanctuary wall. We welcome all members, associate members, guests, and visitors.

There will be one change during the Midweek Lenten Services this year. We will offer only ONE service each Wednesday (with the exception of Ash Wednesday and Holy Week). Our Midweek Lenten Service will be conducted at 4:30 PM with a Lenten Dinner following. I apologize to those who have always and faithfully attended our 7:00 PM Midweek Services. Please consider attending the 4:30 PM services this Lententide.

Look for the many opportunities to worship this upcoming season of Lent, Holy Week, and Easter. Come to church to see Jesus with the eyes of faith; listen to His comforting Word through the voice of the Pastor; and receive from the Pastor as from the hand of Jesus Himself the medicine for your spiritual cancer, His true body and blood; given and shed for you for the forgiveness of your sins.

TRAVELS OF AQUILA AND PRISCILLA

ear brothers and sisters in Christ, we are now on the road again. Well almost, I'll explain later.

We hope that all of you had a wonderful holiday season and thus far this year has been good to you. We have had the pleasure of spending time with our daughter and her family. Her three children were able to be home for Christmas. What a blessing we have that all of our grandchildren have grown to be responsible adults and gainfully employed in their chosen fields of endeavor.

During our stay in Austin, we spent some time getting established as citizens of the Republic of Texas, we are no longer Floridians. This is not to say that we don't miss you and the wonderful weather in the sunshine state.

Even though we kept pretty busy we did find time to spend three days down in San Antonio. San Antonio is a wonderful long weekend town. Pretty riverwalk with all different shops and restaurants, semi tropical landscaping. (similar to what you are used to seeing in Florida). A feel like being in Mexico, but a lot cleaner and you can drink the water.

On Aquila's birthday we decided to drive to Enchanted Rock State Park, about one and a half hours drive northwest of Austin. Enchanted Rock rises about 450 feet above the surrounding landscape and is the third largest rock in this hemisphere. Record climb time is 15 minutes, it took Aquila 45 minutes from the parking lot to the top but two hours to get back. Reason, Aquila, could not find the trail he took to get to the top so he chose to choose rock formations that looked like the one's he saw coming up for a guide. Needless to say he wound up on the opposite side of the rock.

We resumed our travels heading west on January 7th with plans to use Fort Stockton TX as our base to explore Southwest Texas. On the way to Fort

Stockton we stopped at Fort Lancaster.

During the early 1800's a chain of forts were established along the southern route to protect wagon trains as they



traveled through Comanche territory. The forts were abandon by the Union during the Civil War and some were occupied by the Confederacy. Peak travel occurred during the Gold Rush years but by the late 1860's with the transcontinental railroad came into place the forts were no longer needed. Some of these forts have been partially restored and it is quit interesting to learn about what life was like in the forts.

Our favorites are Ft. Lancaster were you can still see the ruts in the rocks the wagons made as they came down the hillside into the fort. The other is Fort Davis, the home of the Black Buffalo soldiers, very well restored.

While we stayed in Fort Stockton we visited Big Bend National Park, Big Bend Ranch Texas State Park and McDonald Observatory.

Big Bend is a huge park with many climate zones from sub tropical along the Rio Grande to Alpine in the mountains.

Vistas and rock formations that are a joy to behold. Photography can not do it little justice. God sure dose have a great paint brush, because of the composition of each of the different formations we must have seen the full color spectrum from white to black. We walked a few trails, visited what was left of some homesites and graves of early pioneers that had made an attempt to settle in this area.

Also, spotted coyote, javelin, deer, and of course road runners.

The State Park has a highway that parallels the Rio Grand. Because of the nature of the river path and the terrain sometimes you are high looking down (Continued on page 6)

the river and a stones throw from Mexico and other times looking across a wider river bottom with a high palisade on the other side. It is amazing that because of all the grit the water carries it is actually sanding or craving itself a path through rock. We

chose to walk a trail about three miles long through Closed Canyon, a narrow gorge with sheer rock walls about 15 stories high on each side. In some cases we had to slide down on our backside.

Coming back up we had to crawl up on all four. Even though we were tuckered out after that ordeal we enjoyed just about every minute of that walk through God's creation.

McDonald Observatory sits on top of Mount Locke about 7000 ft above sea level. The views from here are incredible, one can see 40 miles to the horizon. There are a variety of telescopes that are used at this site for astronomical observatory including a radio antenna system that monitors radio waves from distance stars. The accuracy of the system

is that if was a visual device it would enable a person on earth to see a football on the moon. At the beginning I said we were on the road again almost.

Well as we write this we are in Austin, because Aquila mentioned to Priscilla that he noticed a bump on his belly. Next morning we were at Pecos Memorial hospital having a CT scan. Turns out to be a hernia. Doc suggest we get it fixed. Aquila, wants to keep going west. Priscilla says we are going back to get it fixed. The kids are called, they say Dad get it fixed. Aquila, thinks it over and decides if something goes wrong you are going to hear a lot of "I told you so" and most important of all he remembers a happy wife is a happy life. So back to Austin, to see a surgeon. Surgeon, "says not to worry hernia is small it can wait. Besides, it would be a lot better for you if there wasn't so much of you. If you want to get it fixed after you finish your trip I'll still be here." So we should be on the road again in a few days.

International Theological Conferences

In strategic consultation with, and invitation from the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod World Missions and national church bodies, **Luther Academy** is caring for indigenous pastors globally through our Luther Academy Conferences.

The Vision: Our brother pastors remain faithful and grow in their confessional Lutheran identity and capacity at times of great trial and opportunity.

The Challenge: Indigenous ordained pastors have limited theological training; reside in isolated areas of the globe; feel threatened in some cases by militant Islam; have limited or no access to other pastors or missionaries; and are often quite impoverished.

Luther Academy Conferences are conducted by Lutheran scholars with knowledge of each region and last four to five days. Costs vary due to local economics and the capacity of local pastors to contribute. Luther Academy costs include airfare, visas, local transportation, meals, housing and a small stipend for guest presenters. Additionally, costs of meals, housing, materials and in some cases transportation for attending pastors may be necessary. The conferences provide strength and encouragement to the pastors and unity in confession.


Prayer – The Circle creates a unique network of Christians who together seek to help those in serious need. Prayer requests will often go out to Circle members via the President's office



BALLOT RETURN BOX



POSITION DESCRIPTIONS

Below are just a few of the positions which are vacant at this time. Please read the descriptions and prayerfully consider stepping up to fill one of these positions. Without the many wonderful and faithful volunteers, we would not be able to fully minister to our congregation and the community.

SUNDAY SCHOOL SUPERINTENDENT: The primary duties would be to coordinate the schedules for Sunday School teachers, prepare the materials & make sure they are available, review attendance and work with parents to encourage attendance and see if rides are needed (not to necessarily provide the rides, but to contact somebody who could); work with Pam Replinger to address any concerns of Sunday School teachers, and assist in Rally Day and Vacation Bible School as able.

BOARD OF HUMAN CARE: The Chair of this very critical board works closely with the Pastor to insure proper care to individual members and families of the congregation. The Board of Human Care is expansive as it gives attention to emotional, physical, psychological, and spiritual maladies of God's people. With the help of the Pastor, the Chair trains members of the Board of Human Care to make hospital visits as well as visits to the shut-in and the infirm. The Chair oversees a prayer-chain with members who are not connected to the internet to receive E-prayers. The Chair also assigns a Coordinator to other programs of mercy within the congregation, i.e. Monthly Blood Pressure, Disaster Preparedness, Stephen Ministries, Caring Network, Cards of Comfort, and Christian Support Groups. The Board of Human Care may also participate in community events, i.e. Blood Drives and Relay For Life. The Chair of this board is also required to attend the monthly Church Council Meeting (2nd Monday at 7 PM), and prepare a brief report of the board's work to the Council and to the Voters' Assembly each quarter.

BOARD OF ASSIMILATION: The Chair of this important board works with the Pastor and the Chairs of other boards and committees to integrate new members into the life of the congregation. The Chair monitors the guidelines for proper use of the visitor's desk in the narthex. The Chair delegates the following responsibilities to the members of the Board of Assimilation: Supply greeters for Sunday Church services; Provide 'visitor bags' for first time visitors to Redeemer before Sunday services; Provide New Member Packets for all incoming new members; Take pictures of all new members; Place pictures in New Member Showcase (located in the narthex); and Provide the Newsletter Editor with pictures of all new members. The Chair of this board is also required to attend the monthly Church Council Meeting (2nd Monday at 7 PM), and prepare a brief report of the board's work to the Council and to the Voters' Assembly each quarter.
