# "An Encouraging Word Goes a Long Way"

"Well done, good and faithful servants. Depart in peace." These are words I usually speak to the elders, communion assistants, and acolytes following the distribution of Holy Communion. They are meant as words of encouragement. They are not my words, but words I have pulled from Holy Scripture. For many of us the familiar phrase, "Well done, good and faithful servants," comes from a parable of Jesus (Matthew 26:14-30; Luke 19:11-27). After entrusting his property to a few servants, the master returns home to see the good order of his land and then tells his servants how much he is pleased.

How do you encourage someone? What words do you use to build someone up, to edify them, to lift them up? "For whatever was written in former days was written for our instruction, that through endurance and **through the encouragement of the Scriptures** we might have hope," (Romans 15:4).

To be sure, when God's Word is used as a means to provide encouragement for you, much more is given. In His Word, God cleanses you (Psalm 51:2); God heals you (Psalm 107:20); God gives you the gift of repentance (2 Timothy 2:25); God gives you the gift of faith (Romans 10:17); and God makes you holy (John 17:17).


Having the Word of God roll off our lips isn't as easy as it sounds. Many of us are not well versed or versed at all in the sacred Scriptures. That comment isn't meant as a strike against you. The point that I'm attempting to drive here is still going back to a previous question: What words do you use to encourage someone?

Throughout my life, I have received an encouraging word from many different people: a dedicated teacher, a devoted coach, a caring friend. However, there was one special moment in my life when I received the greatest encouragement of all. That word came from my dad.

It was nearly 14 years ago when I sat down with both my mom and dad to explain that I was taking their daughter-in-law and grandchildren and moving to Ft. Wayne, Indiana to enter into the seminary to become a Lutheran pastor. Upon hearing the news and without hesitation, my father stood up with outstretched arms and said, "Who can argue with God?" I too

then stood up to enter into those open arms to be held by them. We hugged each other and cried tears of joy.

If there was ever a time a child needed to receive approval from his father that was when I received mine. His encouraging word goes a long way.



Every year since entering into the ministry I receive many, many encouraging words from people like you. They come during the usual times of the year like Christmas, Easter, Pastor Appreciation Month, and even when I celebrate a birthday or another year of marriage with my wife, Lisa. The words inscribed on the card or the ones written by your own hand are truly appreciated and received as wonderful words of encouragement. Every word in every card I treasure for Lisa will tell you I don't throw a single one of them away ... really. Your encouraging word goes a long way.

And then there are times, many times — out of the blue it seems — when I receive a card, a note, an email, a text message, or a phone call with words of encouragement, thanks, and support. I don't know what I have done to deserve such kindness but again, your encouraging word goes a long way.

Your encouraging word helps me face and eventually get through difficult circumstances. And yet can you see how God uses you to encourage me with your words which are born out of faith in God? So, how do you encourage someone? Use the words given you by the Holy Spirit who dwells within you (2 Timothy 1:13-14).

Each time before stepping into the pulpit to supply you with an encouraging word, I pray Psalm 19:14: "May the words of my mouth and the meditation of my heart be pleasing to You O Lord, my Rock and Redeemer." And then I conclude with, "Send now Your Holy Spirit into my heart placing words in my mind and on my lips, that I may proclaim the wonderful works of Your Son, Jesus Christ, my Lord and Savior. Amen"

True Christian stewardship is always a response to the love of God for us. The Apostle John said it so well: "We love because He first loved us."

So, during this month of February when "Valentine's Day" reminds us of human love, we do well to pause and reflect on the divine love of Jesus. By the power and presence of the Holy Spirit we are equipped to show our love through deeds and words that support and encourage.

Christian stewardship is the free and joyous activity of the child of God and God's family, the church, in managing all of life and life's resources for God's purposes. Let your love show in your giving of time, talent and financial resources to God's glory and the expansion of His kingdom.

#### LCMS LIFE CONFERENCE

LCMS Life Conference: We Must Help the Weak (St. Titus, Acts 20:35)

A Sermon by Rev. Christopher Esget, Immanuel Lutheran Church, Alexandria, VA

All life is not equal." These are the words of Mary Elizabeth Williams, in her Jan. 23 *Salon* article, "So what if abortion ends life?" Williams acknowledges the humanity of the aborted child, yet justifies the taking of life with that chilling statement, "All life is not equal."

She observes that we make other judgments regarding the taking of life, such as by drone strikes, capital punishment, or allowing a patient with a terminal illness to die. But of course, the unborn babies in question are not criminals or terrorists, nor in the throes of death.



Lutherans and Pro-life Advocacy

"All life is not equal" is the lie that upheld **slavery** for so long in this great land. "All life is not equal" is the lie that upholds **racism** still today. "All life is not equal" was the lie that drove the obliteration of **six million Jews**. "All life is not equal" is the lie tyrants still today employ for **ethnic cleansing**. "All life is not equal" is the lie told by the greatest monsters ever to arise from the race of men. "All life is not equal" is the lie that **the powerful have more rights than the powerless**. "All life is not equal" is the lie that one person's **convenience** trumps another's most basic human right: **the right to life**.

Williams grounds her lie in the fiction of autonomy:

A fetus can be a human life without having the same rights as the woman in whose body it resides. She's the boss. Her life and what is right for her circumstances and her health should automatically trump the rights of the non-autonomous entity inside of her. Always.

Thus the innocent human child is given the status of an enemy combatant, treated worse than a terrorist held at Guantanamo Bay.

Autonomy is the devil's lie: "You shall be as gods" is nothing other than "You shall be autonomous, you shall be a law unto yourself." But none of us is autonomous, and none of us is viable.

God has put us into community, into church and family and state precisely so that we will learn to love our neighbor, so that we will set aside the delusion of autonomy and our selfish desires to serve our neighbor. "None of us lives to himself, and no one dies to himself. For if we live, we live to the Lord; and if we die, we die to the Lord. Therefore, whether we live or die, we are the Lord's" (Rom. 14.7f). To be the Lord's, to belong to the Lord Jesus Christ, is to love the weak, the wretched, the burdensome, the annoying, the stinking, the foolish.

That is easy in the abstract. I find it easy to come to a conference and speak generically about the value of life. Where it becomes hard, where it collides into the concrete barrier of all my selfish desires, is when I'm confronted by a man asking for money and I think, "Get a job"; when I'm confronted by a troubled person and I think, "Get a life"; when I'm confronted by a scrupulous person and think, "Get over it"; when I'm confronted by an irritating person and think, "Get away from me."

For **I would like to be autonomous**. I want my wife to obey, I want my church to do what I say, I want my neighbors and government to get out of my way. That's the sinful flesh, raging in me and you and our entire race.

Whenever we sin against God, we declare ourselves autonomous, rebelling all over again against our Creator. And whenever we sin against our neighbor, we declare right along with the abortion lobby and every murderous tyrant, "All life is not equal," my life is more important than yours.

The world says, "All life is not equal," but God says, "All life I made." The devil says, "All life is not equal," but God says, "All life I love." The flesh says, "All life is not equal," but God says, "All life I desire be saved, and come to the knowledge of the truth."

So through the words of St. Paul in today's first reading, the Holy Spirit calls us to repentance by saying, "We must help the weak."

We must help the weak first by repenting of our selfishness.

We must help the weak by speaking for the defenseless – the unborn child, the infirm widow.

We must help the weak by giving mosquito nets to fight malaria in Africa.

We must help the weak by supporting the local crisis pregnancy center.

We must help the weak by forgiving their sins as we wish to be forgiven.

We must help the weak by welcoming the difficult, the different, the strange, the abused, the lonely into our churches.

It begins anew this morning by acknowledging that **we are weak**. Our bodies are weak, soon to die. Our souls are weak, quick to despair. Our wills are weak, quick to compromise. Our ears are weak, too eager to take in gossip. Our eyes are weak, too quick to take in impure images. Our tongues are weak, too swift to slander. Our prayers are weak, spoken without confidence.

But today, the Lord comes again to us weak men and says, "I will be your strength." He comes to the weak of body and says, "I have trampled down death by My death; I will be your life." He comes to the sinner and says, "I will be your righteousness." He comes to the anxious and says, "I will be your comfort." He comes to the fatherless and says, "My Father will be your Father."

This is what compelled Him to become incarnate. In the divine counsel of the Holy Trinity, God said, "We must help the weak." And thus the Logos, the Word, made Himself weak as an infant, taking on the weakness of our mortal nature.

The Father sent His Son to the blind and said, "We must help the weak," and blind Bartimaeus recovered his sight.

The Father sent His Son to the deaf and said, "We must help the weak," and the deaf heard the Good News.

The Father sent His Son to the sexually impure and said, "We must help the weak," and the prostitute anointing Jesus' feet with her tears became virginal again.

The Father sent His Son to the corrupt and said, "We must help the weak," and Zacchaeus restored what he had defrauded and gave away his treasure.

The Father sent His Son to the rebels and said, "We must help the weak," and to the penitent thief Paradise was opened.

On this festival of St Titus, the Lord again says to us, "We must help the weak," and we weak men say, "This we desire, help us by Your grace."

For God has regarded all life as equal. To Him every life is precious, in Him every life has value—even us weak sinners, and the vulnerable we wish to protect.

Listen to the Apostle: "We must help the weak." Trust God who declares: 'I will help the weak.' Confess to the world, "All life is equal, even—no, *especially* the life of the weak."

#### THE ABORTION DEBATE 40 YEARS LATER

As many of you know Pastor and I attended the March for Life in Washington DC on Friday January, 25<sup>th</sup>. The March for Life was the precursor to the Life Conference that the Life Ministries arm of the LCMS hosted on Saturday, January 26<sup>th</sup>. Many of you also know that Pastor and I are Pro-Life. This is not, as some would believe, a political issue, but rather, as Christians, it is a Biblical issue. Further, it is difficult to deny that a fetus is a baby with the technology of 3D/4D ultrasound. Moreover, we have seen the beautiful miracle of life given to us in our children and grandchildren. The abortion debate is near and dear to us because we feel it to be of the utmost importance that we protect the unborn, as Jesus says: "and the King will answer them, 'Truly, I say to you, as you did it to one of the least of these my brothers, you did it to me'" (Matthew 25:40). The least of these is the unborn child in the womb; the least of these is the disabled individual; the least of these is the person suffering with depression; the least of these may even be you and me. So we gathered on the mall, listening to various speakers, some public figures and some private individuals, as well as clergymen from various denominations, speaking on the sanctity of human life.

The march took place on Constitution Avenue and continued to the Supreme Court Building where of course we know the Roe v. Wade ruling took place January 22, 1973. 40 years later we have 55 million victims. These 55 million victims, the unseen children that have not had the opportunity to be born, to be Baptized, to run, to play, to fall down and get a scraped knee, to be picked up and hugged by their Mommy or Daddy. I urge you to understand that this is probably an underestimation because make no mistake my dear Christian friends the victims include not just the babies but also the women that live with that "abortion decision" or as Christians the abortion sin. The sin that takes the innocent life of a child and the motherhood away from that woman and, the sin that takes away the fatherhood of a man. We sometimes forget about those "other" victims.

Some scream out: "I am pro-life, what you have done is murdered your baby!" Others shout: "It's a child not a choice!", and still more exclaim: "Thou shall not commit murder." Outcries like these, sound more like the Westboro Baptist Church pietistic demonstrators than the forgiven redeemed Christian Lutherans that our Lord Jesus Christ was to His followers and to us today. This abortion sin is unfortunately the "dirty



little secret" in the church that no one ever wants to discuss, most especially the woman who was put in the position to make that "decision". We as a Christian church body have made the abortion issue the elephant in the room, as it were, that nobody wants to address. We forget that without hesitation our Lord, Jesus Christ died for ALL sin, EVERY sin, not just the little white lies, not just the bounced check, not just the cursing and swearing, but for ALL of them; the alcoholism that destroys the family, the pornography that destroys the marriage, the lies of adultery, the pre-marital sex, the drug abuse and yes the women that have had abortions. Yes, even that sin Jesus died for. He died so that you may know the utter peace and joy that you are forgiven and you get to go to heaven with Him, where you will be reunited with your baby, face to face.

As a result of our trip to Washington D.C., we are even more resolute about the Pro-Life journey than we were before. The Life Conference was filled with many speakers and highlighted our own Synod President Rev. Matthew Harrison. He proclaimed: "Jesus exudes life and joy. We are a people who have much joy over life. We see in the face of death our voices are very much needed and also our social action is very much needed to right this wrong." And further he states: "The secret to the joy of life is acting on behalf of those who cannot act for themselves. We must act".

This call to action follows the threefold mission of the LCMS: Witness, Mercy and Life Together. President Harrison quoted Galatians 2:8-10 and reminded us all that we exist to bear witness to Christ. We certainly cannot have the church without Word & Sacrament, but Jesus came to serve; God serving us and hence we should serve our neighbor, especially the "least of these"! Whatever our vocation in life, we should be witnessing to others the love of Christ and having mercy on others as Christ has mercy on us. We should also be speaking the truth in love regarding issues that are directly against God's Word; abortion is one of those issues. As a church body we can no longer be woeful quietists on issues that are against God's Word and that includes taking a stand with our government. The avalanche has let go as a country, our society continues to fall into various forms of debauchery. The stand you take may be in the form of your vote, it may be your dollar, it may be your ability to March for Life, but it is necessary to speak the truth in love and take a stand!

I would ask you to take a look at the stand on life that your LCMS is taking through the various websites I am providing below. I would also ask you to think about Marching for Life next year in DC. There were over 250 LCMS members at the March and Life conference. It would be wonderful to have over 1000 participants from our synod next year! There is so much more to

# MY SERENITY

There's a lot I don't appreciate. A lot I don't take into consideration. Maybe there's too much that I don't even notice at all. I tend to change myself, my preference, and my moods like it's a job. But all my life there has been one thing that has never changed for me. My love for music. My love for producing it, for playing it, for learning it. My love for opening a new book and staring at a page of musical puzzles. My love for finally conquering the difficult measures that I swore I would never get past. My love for the smiles I would see in the silence that followed my performance. And my love for the days when I was alone and played ever not flawlessly and felt completely and entirely invincible.

Music has been a part of me since I was little. Not only surrounding me, but embedded deep in my heart and soul. I would sit at the piano in my high chair and pound at the piano keys and people would "awe" at me. I grew up and asked my parents for piano lessons, not knowing they were going to make me take them regardless. I will never forget my first lesson. I learned to find my way around the keys: The low tones and the high tones, and the ones right in between. My arms stretching to discover the lowest and highest keys, but somehow finding their way there. My legs dangled off the bench leaving my feet far from the ground. This became my home. Sometimes home life gets a little stressful. A little overwhelming. In all honesty, music is probably the most important, most reliable thing in my life. It's one thing I will never doubt, or ever question. There's been too many times that I have been at a loss for words. Days when I hate the world and I'm uneasy inside and my feelings build up until I feel like I could explode. That's when I listen to something. Anything. I can pick out the melody, and I can close my eyes and find a way to relate it to myself. I can sing words someone else wrote and feel like I'm moving the weight of the world off my shoulders. I can find a way to feel at peace with myself and my surroundings and convince myself that everything is okay. Music has found a way to describe people, places, and feelings that I've experienced, but could never find a way to express. Music has mended my broken hearts, fixed my bad days, and soothed any overwhelm or stress I had been feeling. It has the power to turn any harsh mindset I develop into a state of euphoria.

Music is the one way of universal communication. Harmonies and patterns of notes are something that every person in the world can understand. It connects all races, genders and religions. I've learned a language in which I can speak to anyone. I can touch anyone's heart and I can connect to a stranger's darkest secret with a song that may be far too familiar to me. I can brighten someone's day. I can make someone feel less alone. I can give someone something to whistle when they're lonely and losing hope.

Music isn't just a tune, or a beat that you find yourself mindlessly humming. It's the words and the patterns that you find yourself singing because you feel like someone else understands you. It's what makes you feel less alone. Music has given me confidence. The confidence of knowing that I will never spend a day in silence. It has given me one of the deepest emotions I've ever felt: 15 years of pure passion and dedication. It's given me skills, and it's given me bragging rights. It's given me something to look forward to everyday. It has influenced my heart, my body, and my soul in a way no words ever could. When I'm sad, music is my joy. When I'm lonely, music is my friend. And when I find myself wondering, music is my inspiration. Music isn't important in my life. Music is my life.
