PASTOR'S NOTES

Psalm 96:3

Declare his glory among the nations, his marvelous deeds among all peoples.

Psalm 78:4

We will not hide them from their descendants; we will tell the next generation the praiseworthy deeds of the Lord, his power, and the wonders he has done.

For over 175 years, the Lutheran Church Missouri Synod has been proclaiming the truth of God's Word to the people of America. What started as a small presence of German Saxons settling in Perry County, south of St. Louis in 1839 began



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to grow. In 1847, 12 Pastors, representing 14 congregations from Illinois, Indiana, Missouri, Michigan, New York, and Ohio, met at First St. Paul Lutheran Church in Chicago, IL. There they organized and signed the founding church body's first constitution on April 26. Originally calling their church body, The German Evangelical Lutheran Synod of Missouri, Ohio, and Other States, 100 years later in 1947 it was shortened to the Lutheran Church Missouri Synod.

Through the efforts of these pastors proclaiming the truth of God's Word, the new church body began growing and in 1853 established 4 different Districts – Central, Eastern, Northern, and Western.

The growth continued and was enhanced by the LCMS's willingness to embrace and use new technological advances of the time. In 1924, it created its own radio station – KFUO – and developed its own international radio program in 1930 called *The Lutheran Hour*. In 1952, the LCMS used the technological advancement of television and began broadcasting its own TV program called – *This Is the Life*.

Due to the changing times in which we live, the LCMS has continued to develop different means by which to train both men and women for service in His kingdom as teachers for their schools, Directors of Christian Education, Directors of Christian Outreach, as well as Parish Musicians, and Directors of Family Life Ministry for their churches. But different means have also been developed over the years to raise up men as Pastors in order to boldly proclaim the truth of God's Word.

PASTOR'S NOTES (CONTINUED)

Over the years, the LCMS has developed several different routes by which men can be certified as Pastors in the LCMS. One such route is being used by Collins Sita, a member of Redeemer, to be certified as a Pastor for Redeemer. It is called the *Specific Ministry Program (SMP)*.

The *Specific Ministry Program* is a 4-year synodical seminary program to train men as Pastors involving a mix of real time on campus class work, on-line classes, and an assigned veteran Pastor to serve as a mentor.

For their class work, either on campus or on-line, the men take a total of 16 classes over the 4 year period. The first 2 years – the pre-ordination years – the men serve their congregation as a Vicar, or in the terms of the world – an Intern. During this time, in addition to their class work, they are working in their congregation under the supervision of their Pastor/Mentor to begin the process of being comfortable performing many of the expected duties of a Pastor, which at Redeemer includes hospital – home bound visitations, leading chapel for the Child Care and School, leading Bible studies, assisting and leading worship, as well as preaching. During this time, the Vicar is not allowed to consecrate the elements for communion, conduct funerals or weddings.

After the first 2 years, the Vicar is evaluated by the seminary as to whether he is meeting the qualifications and standards of the Pastoral office. If so, the candidate is allowed to be ordained, thus allowing him to now add those pastoral duties that he was not allowed to perform as a Vicar, such as consecrating the elements for communion and conducting funerals and weddings. After ordination, there are still 2 more years of class work in order to have a well rounded and strong background in the teaching and preaching of God's Word.

Although my time as Redeemer's Intentional Interim Pastor will come to an end on June 30th, I will continue to be Vicar Collins' mentor the entire 4 year process. I will be checking in and talking with him on a consistent, if not weekly, basis. I will be mentoring him in regards to the practical work of a Pastor. I will also check in with him regarding his class work to tutor and coach him. I will also serve him in his development of being a Pastor by coaching him in his work with the congregation and its ministries. In this aspect my job as a coach will be to help him reflect and think ahead in order to gain a deeper insight and awareness regarding where he needs to grow, learn, and develop as he seeks to be the shepherd Redeemer needs.

As the congregational gathering to discuss the future of the ministry at Redeemer held on Sunday, February 16 indicated, there are some challenging tasks that each of the three ministries of church, child care, and school need to address. One of those tasks is being undertaken with Collins willingness to be trained as Redeemer's next pastor through the SMP program. There are however other tasks that need to be addressed. With prayer, dedicated work, commitment to the truth of God's Word, and responding to God's leading through the power of His Spirit, all things are possible and these challenges can be met.

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God's Instruments, God's Stewards

For we are his workmanship, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand, that we should walk in them. (Eph. 2:10)

Some pastors refer to these words as "the most forgotten words in the Scriptures." They are forgotten because they follow the familiar and critical words before it. The preceding two verses that overshadow Ephesians 2:10 are words of justification: "For by grace you have been saved through faith. And this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God, not a result of works, so that no one may boast" (Eph. 2:8–9). These are words preached regularly. They are assigned as confirmation verses. They carry with them the very heart of what it means to be a redeemed child of God!

Precisely because the previous verses are so central to salvation, they often overpower our practice of stewardship! We have been saved by grace. This is certain and sure because of Jesus. Works play no role in our salvation. No credit taking for us! Grace is freely given. Faith is miraculously created by the Spirit and joyously received. This truth is so wonderful and so encompassing that we often miss out on WHY we are redeemed.


The grace of God revealed in Jesus calls us to faith. But St. Paul doesn't stop with grace and faith. He continues to the logical conclusion. Just like the creation declares the handiwork of God, the redemption of sinners like you and me declares His greatest handiwork! Redeemed stewards are created to reflect the grace and mercy God showers on us to others.

As Lutherans, we understand that good works flow from faith in Jesus Christ. They are the fruit of the tree of salvation into which we have been grafted by grace. Sanctification and stewardship are both on-going and active confessions of what the Lord has done in us. These works are not always spectacular. Many times, they are simply parents showing Jesus to their children. They are compassionate actions that live out the truth of the Gospel to co-workers and even complete strangers. While they can be grand endeavors, more likely they are simple, beautiful works which highlight what Jesus has done in us.

These works aren't random either. They have been planned by God. God planned to use you as a faithful steward as you walk the road that leads you through your daily life. There are no chance encounters or coincidences. They have been planned by the Lord of the universe for the benefit of His creation. Good works are what point to God's greatest work: Jesus!

He calls you and me to walk in this faith, which flows from this grace, which has been poured out on us in Jesus. But even this is not to our credit. We are simply called to be faithful stewards of God's grace so that we may share it with those who need is as much as we do. God's Spirit carries us along in this. We are just the steward — the instrument in His hand to accomplish His plan and glorify Him!

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School

Let us run with endurance the race that is set before us, looking to Jesus. Hebrews 12:1-3

K-1 During the month of February our class began to learn about how Jesus Heals and Helps. They had seven lessons that began with the "Woman at the Well" and ended with how "Jesus Walks on Water". Throughout the month we also learned about safety in the home, safety during storms, and bicycle safety. During our math time we have fun doing graphing and pie charts. For Valentines they were each given a box of conversation hearts and graphed the colors. We also took those hearts and did an experiment to see how they dissolve in vinegar, water, and soda. The children of K-1 love doing hands on activities, next month we will look forward to doing more fun hands on activities for Dr. Seuss Week and get the children outside to read for "Read Across America". *Ms. Pam and Ms. Leslie*

2nd & 3rd Our class has been following the introduction to nocturnal animals illustrated throughout student's text books. Students ran screaming in fright. Several students reassured the class that the black snake was harmless and helpful to the environment. Students are being assigned a nocturnal animal about which to do a report. Last week, students sang "The Fruits of the Spirit" song. There was a discussion about each one.  4^{th} & 5^{th} The class enjoyed a Valentine's Day party with loads of goodies and spreading love all over the classroom. We are studying the Life of Jesus in the Bible class.
