



ANOTHER TREASURE: HONOR AND GOOD REPUTATION

Dr. Martin Luther says, “Over and above our own body, spouse, and temporal possessions, we still have another treasure – honor and good reputation” (Large Catechism VIII 255).

What does it mean when the Eighth Commandment instructs us against bearing “false witness against your neighbor?” In the Small Catechism, Luther teaches what God forbids Christians to do and what God requires Christians to do. This he says concerning all the Commandments, not just this one.

Among the Ten Commandments, the Eighth Commandment is certainly in the running to be considered the most frequently misunderstood and over abused (with exception to the First Commandment). Some have paraphrased the Eighth Commandment to say, “You shall not lie.” But it is really much more than that.

To be sure, the first three Commandments deal with how mankind is intended to act toward God, and the 4th through 7th Commandments can be sinned against with thoughts, words, or actions. However, the Eighth

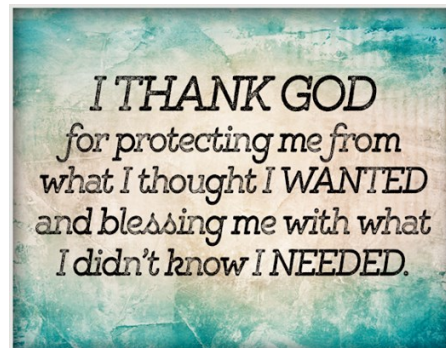
Commandment deals primarily with our words, and how they relate to other people’s honor and good reputation.

It is obvious that this Commandment forbids Christians from lying, not only in formal testimony, as in the court of law, but also in private conversation. This would include repeating untrue things we have heard from others, as well as starting untruths ourselves, and that includes all lies, both those told publicly to many people or those told privately to only one person. God’s Word reveals to us that this sinful action toward your neighbor is gossip and hearsay; “a restless evil, full of deadly poison” (James 3:8).

Not only does this Commandment apply to lies, but also to telling the truth in ways that are harmful, especially to one’s honor and good reputation. This would include revealing secrets or other information one has been told with an understanding of confidentiality. It would also include revealing sins or other unfavorable truths that were previously private or giving even greater publicity to

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STEWARDSHIP

The Gospels are filled with irony. Death itself is defeated by the death of Jesus. Jesus, the Son of God the Father, is given to Pilate in exchange for Barabbas, which means “son of the father.” But one particularly puzzling bit of irony is that Judas was given charge of the moneybag.

In response to Mary Magdalene’s lavish gift, when she poured out almost a year’s wages to anoint Jesus’ feet, Judas replied, “Why was this ointment not sold for three hundred denarii and given to the poor” (John 12:5)? And then John tells us, “He said this, not because he cared for the poor, but because he was a thief, and having charge of the moneybag he used to help himself to what was put into it” (John 12:6).

So, why is Judas put in charge of the money? Jesus could have put any of his disciples in charge of it. He could have put Nathaniel in charge, of whom Jesus said, “Behold, an Israelite indeed, in whom there is no deceit” (John 1:47), or John, “the disciple whom Jesus loved” (John 21:20), or Levi, the tax collector, who was financially savvy (Luke 5:27). But he didn’t. He chose Judas, whom He called “a devil” (John 6:70). Why?

Jesus put His money where his mouth was. “Do not lay up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moth and rust destroy and where thieves break in and steal, but lay up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust destroys and where thieves do not break in and steal” (Matthew 6:19–20). Our Lord put not His trust in earthly treasures, but in the word and will of His Father. The Lord will provide.

In Judas, we see the heart and gut-wrenching end of one who treasured the wrong thing. “Where your treasure is, there your heart will be also” (Matthew 6:21; Luke 12:34). “No one can serve two masters, for either he will hate

the one and love the other, or he will be devoted to the one and despise the other.

You cannot serve God and money” (Matthew 6:24; Luke 16:13). It’s an alarming example, a visceral image, of what loving money and hating God can look like.

But no one, save Jesus, was the wiser. During Jesus’ three-year ministry, Judas looked, talked, and acted like the other eleven. He seemed to be about the right things. But “love of money is the root of all kinds of evil. It is through this craving that some have wandered away from the faith and pierced themselves with many pangs” (1 Timothy 6:10). And this craving led

Judas to sell Jesus for thirty pieces of silver, which the chief priests used to buy his own grave—an ironic transaction indeed.

All of this is to say that money is a good thing but it is not God. Use it for the purpose which God gives it. Spend it on providing for your family. Spend it on support of your community. Give it to support and provide for the work of God among you in church, the ministry of Word and Sacrament, through which you receive forgiveness, life, and salvation. Invest in all these things. Put your treasure where God calls you to put it, and your heart will follow. Your hearts will be set on things above, for these things—family, society, and church—are of God. “Seek first the kingdom of God and His righteousness, and all this will be added to you” (Matthew 6:33).

So, do not be anxious, but trust in the mercies of God. All you need will be given by your Father in heaven. “For it is your Father’s good pleasure to give you the kingdom” (Luke 12:32). The Father can easily out-give what any thief can steal. And the beauty is: He not only can, but does. There is nothing ironic about that.

unfavorable truths that have already been made public about another person.

Luther says, "This Commandment forbids all sins of the tongue, by which we may injure or confront our neighbor. To bear false

witness is nothing else than a work of the tongue. Now, God prohibits whatever is done with the tongue against a fellow man. This applies to false preachers with their doctrine and blasphemy, false judges and witnesses with their verdict, or outside of court by lying and speaking evil. Here belongs particularly the detestable, shameful vice of speaking behind a person's back and slandering, to which the devil spurs us on, and of which much could be said" (Large Catechism VIII 263-264).

In general, Christians should make every effort not to harm the honor and good reputation of other people. Private sins and offenses should be dealt with privately for the preservation of the honor and good reputation of everyone involved. In Matthew 18, Jesus instructed the people to first go to a person privately who has sinned against them. If he listens, then you have won the brother over. If he doesn't listen, then go to him with 2 or three witnesses. Only if all attempts to win the brother over have failed, may you make the matter public, that is, that you may bring the matter to the church.

The only occasion when it would not be sinful to keep a sin or other unfavorable truths secret is if it is revealed for the sake of helping the person in question or when other people's lives might be in danger.

Some obvious examples of this would be when citizens report a crime, children report bullying or other harmful acts in school, or friends and relatives reveal an addictive behavior or suicidal tendency with the determination of finding help for the person. Even in these cases, though, one is

not to declare such things in public, but rather only to those who have the proper authority to deal with them, such as law enforcement, teachers, pastors, or parents.

Another instance in which it might be not only permissible to make unfavorable truths public is to correct a false statement that has been made publicly by another. For example, if one businessman has publicly defamed another, the only way to correct the lie is to make the first man's sin public in order to defend the honor and good reputation of the second.

A similar instance comes concerning religious teaching. If a religious leader is making public statements or publishing books about God, the Bible, or religious teaching that are blatantly untrue, not only would it be a faithful pastor's option to make this known to the people under his care, and perhaps to the community at large, but he would be negligent if he became aware of such statements and failed to do so.

In both cases, the businessman and the religious leader have made their own sins public, and those seeking to correct them have no choice but to address them likewise.

In any case, the Bible speaks frequently, such as the books of James and Proverbs, about the importance of using our words wisely. We do so when we speak for the sake of helping others and defending their reputation rather than with the intent to do them harm.

We are taught in the Small Catechism to put the best construction on everything, that is, we should explain our neighbor's action in the best possible way.

Last week in Chapel, the children learned of the story of David and Jonathan. While David won battle after battle over the Philistines, the Israelites' King Saul became increasingly jealous of David to the point that he wanted to have David killed. Knowing his father's desire to kill David, Jonathan spoke well of David to him.

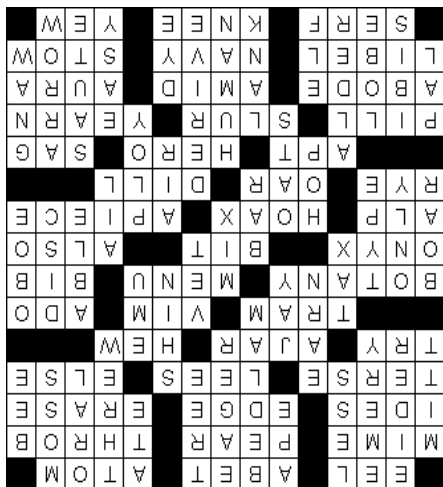
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Saul listened to the voice of Jonathan and swore not to harm David (1 Samuel 19).

Finally, Luther writes, "We cannot do without [honor and good reputation] ... God does not want the reputation, good name, and upright character of our neighbor to be taken away or diminished, just as with his money and possessions. [God] wants everyone to stand in his integrity before wife, children, servants, and neighbors" (Large Catechism VIII 255-256).

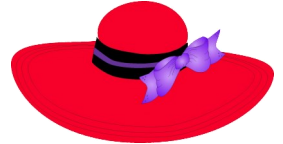

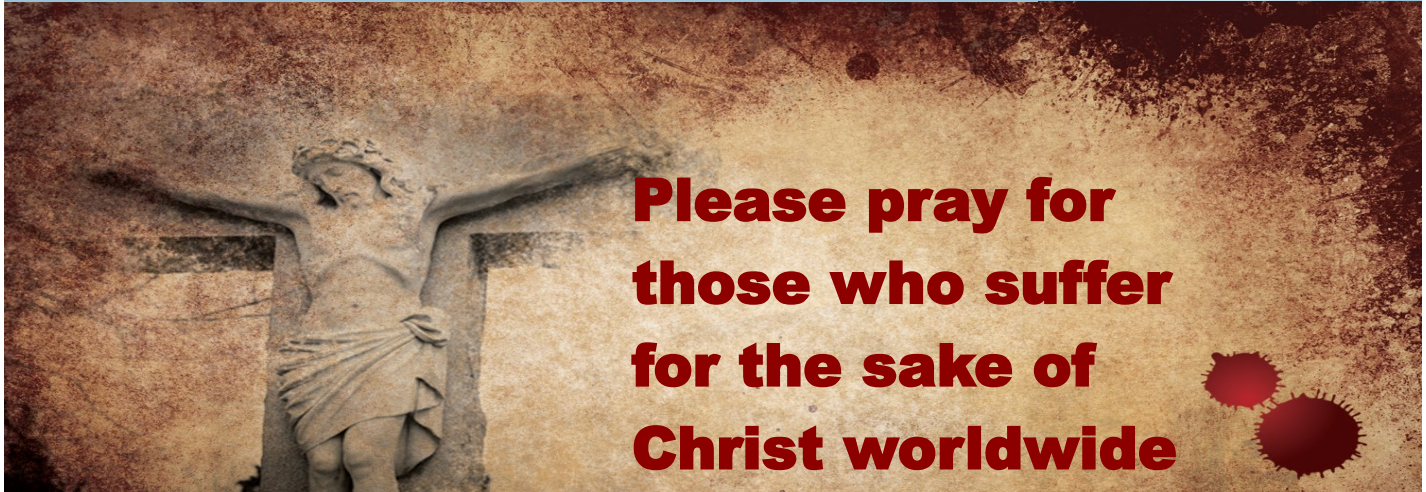

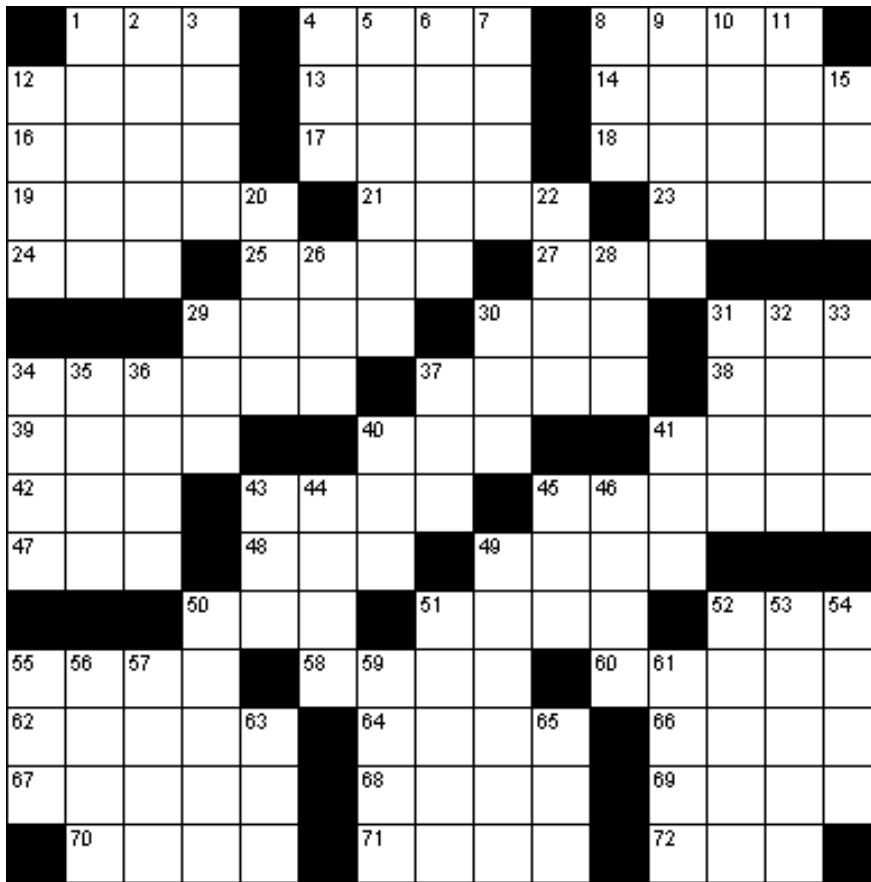
