"The Season for Giving and Receiving"

Oh, how the time has quickly passed. Christmas is right around the corner! Many of us look forward to this time of year. Some of us diligently make plans to shop for a special gift to give to a special loved one. Some of us may even entertain the thought of receiving a certain gift from a certain loved one. To be sure, this is the season for both giving and receiving.

When gifts are given and received during the Christmas holiday there are countless expressions of joy shared between individuals. This is one of the more common reasons why many look forward to this time of year: to share and participate in one another's joy. Giving and receiving carefully wrapped gifts between individuals relinquishes an amazing joyful wonder.

Consider when God gave us His greatest gift in which He carefully wrapped His Son in the womb of a virgin. "For God so loved the world, that He gave His only Son, that whoever believes in Him should not perish but have eternal life" (John 3:16). This we have come to know as the 'Gospel in a nutshell.' This widely known verse; this Good News is called this because John 3:16 is considered a summary of the central teaching of Christianity.

God's plan of salvation for mankind is clearly summarized in this one verse. God the Father gave the world His Son in order to save the world from eternal condemnation. In fact, in the very next verse in John's Gospel, Jesus unpacks for us John 3:16. "For God did not send His Son into the world to condemn the world, but in order that the world might be saved through Him" (John 3:17). God the Father gave us His only begotten Son as a gift in order that the Son of Man would seek and save the lost (Luke 19:10). God the Father has given us an extraordinary gift.


The Apostle John also writes, "to all who receive [Jesus], who believe in His name, He gave the right to become children of God, who were born, not of blood nor of the will of the flesh nor of the will of man, but [born] of God" (John 1:12-13). Those born again through the water and the Word are made children of God. "The Spirit Himself bears witness ... that we are children of God, and if children, then we are heirs — heirs of God and fellow heirs with Christ ... in order that we may also be glorified with Him" (Romans 8:16-17).

God is in the business of giving gifts – His gifts. He didn't stop with just giving us His Son. "Every good gift and every perfect gift is from above, coming down from the Father ... "(James 1:17).

Peter preached, "Repent and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus for the forgiveness of your sins, and you will receive the gift of

the Holy Spirit" (Acts 2:38). In the waters of Baptism God Holy works forgiveness; He gives us His Spirit; He rescues us from death and the power of Satan; He grants us eternal life. The gifts just keep coming.

How then does one believe and receive



these gifts? How does one come to faith, and believe and $\overline{\text{trust}}$ in these words and promises of God? The Apostle Paul writes, "So faith comes from hearing, and hearing through the word of Christ" (Romans 10:17). And Jesus says, "Whoever is of God hears the word of God" (John 8:47a). You are of God. Therefore, you hear His Word. Jesus also says, "When [you] hear the word [of God], receive it with joy" (Luke 8:13).

God the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit continually give you His gifts. You receive it with joy. "For by grace you have been saved through faith. And this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God" (Ephesians 2:8). The Good News of salvation; the gifts of God are the very things you are called to share with others; and to do so with joy.

God gave you the gift of His Son not just to remember and celebrate during the season of Christmas, but He also gave you His Son Jesus so that you would receive Him; believe in Him. Jesus came to save; to give you His gifts of forgiveness, life, and salvation throughout the entire year. He gives you His gifts every day of every month of every year. He loves you with an everlasting love (Jeremiah 31:3).

Paul writes, "I have been crucified with Christ. It is no longer I who live, but Christ who lives in me. And the life I now live in the flesh I live by faith in the Son of God, who loved me and gave Himself for me" (Galatians 2:20).

May the God of all mercy and the giver of all good gifts, grant each of you a Merry Christmas and a blessed New Year.

PRESIDENT'S CORNER

As we move forward into the Christmas season our church is facing many challenges. As you know, we are engaged in a very serious discussion as to whether or not we want to hire a DCE for the purpose of increasing youth involvement at Redeemer. The question we all face is our collective willingness to support the hiring of a DCE by increasing our Sunday contribution. I hope each and every one of us will give prayerful consideration to this important decision. We will vote on this at the December voters meeting and I pray that whichever way the vote goes it turns out to be the right decision for Redeemer. We also have the issue of insurance for our church and vehicles. As you know, the council has called for a special voters meeting on November 28th between services. At this meeting I am going to propose that due to the exorbitant increase in the cost of wind and hail insurance that we self insure that portion of our coverage and use the savings based on our current premium to establish a dedicated reserve fund earmarked for repairs necessitated by wind or hail. In other words if we are able to save \$15000 per year we would make a \$15000 contribution to the reserve fund. Keeping in mind that we have never had an insurance claim I think this is a wise decision. I believe it is inevitable that our insurance premium will continue to increase at an alarming rate that will leave us no choice but to do what I will propose at the voters meeting. This is being brought to the voters rather than a council decision due to the gravity of the situation. Once again I pray that whatever decision we make, it is the right decision for Redeemer.

As you all know, Pastor and Lisa Kress are in Israel visiting the Holy Land. We all hope they are having a wonderful time and look forward to their return but we are blessed in Pastor's absence to have Pastor Schmidt step in and fulfill all Pastoral duties. I know we all look forward to Pastor Schmidt's sermons and bible classes and we owe Pastor Schmidt a debt of gratitude. Let's not forget to thank him.

In closing I hope you all had a blessed Thanksgiving and that the upcoming holidays are filled with joy for each and every one of our church family.

CHRISTIAN SUPPORT GROUP

The support group met on Wednesday, Oct.27th.

These last day parables have one thing in common: they all reflect the nearness of Jesus' death.

Because he knew the cross was close, our Lord talked about such things as a final judgment, the need to stay alert, the practices and the kind of hope that would sustain his followers in the years to come.

The Gospel accounts in which they are preserved were written thirty or more years after Jesus' death and resurrection. The delay of the bridegroom was regarded as a reference to the delay of Christ's promised return that worried the first century church.

The lesson was THE PARABLE OF THE TEN MAIDENS Matthew 25: 1-13

Then the kingdom of heaven shall be compared to ten maidens who took their lamps and went to meet the bride groom. Five of them were foolish, and five were wise. For when the foolish took their lamps, they took no oil with them, but the wise took flasks of oil with their lamps. As the bridegroom was delayed, they all slumbered and slept. But at midnight there was a cry, "Behold, the bridegroom! Come out to meet him." Then all those maidens rose and trimmed their lamps. And the foolish said to the wise, "Give us some of your oil, for our lamps are going out." But the wise replied, "Perhaps there will not be enough for us and for you, go rather to the dealers and buy for yourselves." while they went to buy, the bridegroom came, and those who were ready went in with him to the marriage feast, and the door was shut. Afterward the other maidens came also, saying, "Lord, lord, open to us." But he replied, "Truly, I say to you, I do not know your." Watch therefore, for you know neither the day nor the hour.

The delay of the bridegroom was regarded as a reference to the delay of Christ's promise to return that worried the first century church.

The parable seems to be a clear cut reference to the second coming of Jesus for at least four reasons:

1. The first word, "then" apparently refers to

Matthew 24:44, 50 which tells of the coming of the Son of man and the return of the master of the house.

- 2. All of the parables and sayings in Matthew 24-25, seem to relate to the return of Christ.
- 3. The fourth sentence, especially the phrase, "As the bridegroom is delayed, "fits the actual experience of the Christian church. Many expected Christ (the bridegroom) to return very soon after his ascension and were disappointed at the delay.

The closing words of the parable, "Watch" refer to other sayings about the coming of the Son of man, such as those already noted in Mathew 24:44, 50,

All this justifies the saying that the parable well describes the Christian church awaiting the return of its Lord. The ten maidens represented the church, the bridegroom is Christ, and the delay is the period of waiting for his coming. The sudden appearance of the bridegroom suggests the manner of the coming of Christ, and the closing of the door on the foolish maidens symbolizes the final judgment.

We must return to the time, place and audience when the story was first told. Jesus had been trying in many ways to awaken his people and their leaders to the fact God's promised kingdom had finally come. As Jesus spoke, his words pointed to the doom and disaster, the deliverance and hope that would come with his death, resurrection, and ascension.

We are not to sit upon a mountaintop expecting Christ's return. We are to keep ourselves ready by living as faithful citizens if God's realm. Then neither Christ's coming, nor any other sudden testing experience will catch us unprepared.

The group discussed the lesson and how we can keep ourselves ready. We also mentioned the members of church and friends we would include in our closing prayer.

Big Decision for Redeemer

I was asked to give some thoughts about a DCE (Director of Christian Education) at Redeemer. Even though a DCE is trained to work with all age groups, Redeemer would want the majority of effort directed toward the younger generation in our church and community. After hearing the presentation to our congregation on Oct. 31, I share the following observations with my fellow members at Redeemer:

1) When Jesus said: "Go into the highways and byways and compel them to come in," the challenge is not only to "bring them in" but ask the Holy Spirit to work through us to do everything we can to "keep them coming back!" Also, if many of our own children, youth and adults are not active in church, I believe

it can be helpful for us to ask them "Why." A DCE could be useful in both of these areas.

2) I believe we should be serious about Biblical principles found in Mt 10:16 and Luke 16:8, i.e. How can we use Godgiven wisdom to better reach our members and community?

How can we learn from St. Paul when he says: "I have become all things to all men so that by all possible means I might save some" 1 Corinthians 9:22? If the DCE were to suggest something new, even though it was Biblically acceptable but "different than we're used to," would we give that idea a chance?

3) The DCE could be a key person to provide leadership to the many talented

lay people in Redeemer.

- 4) Since the cost of a DCE would add about \$55,000 per year to our budget, would enough members be willing to increase their offerings a little so Redeemer's budget would not end in the "red" each year? Calling a DCE involves a long-term addition to Redeemer's staff. I believe there should be wide base support for a DCE within Redeemer before a Call is issued.
- 5) Given a favorable analysis of the foregoing concerns, I believe a DCE could be a blessing to Redeemer. A DCE could help lead our congregation in directions pleasing to our Lord, and I would be happy to support this Call.



Ellie. We will also take a collection for the Child Care Angel Scholarship.



HUMAN CARE

Human Care has a new member. We welcome Mary Ann Sochacki, a retired nurse residing in Pt. Charlotte. She is also a new member to Redeemer. Mary Ann will help take blood pressure readings on the last Sunday of each month.

Our Blood Draw on October 24th brought 14 donors. While this seems like a small number, the Blood Center representative said this is good due to the time of year. Many churches much larger than us bring in around 4 donors. We really hope to greatly surpass this number in December.

There are only a few reasons for not donating: if you take Coumadin, are under 17 years, have an iron deficiency or weigh less than 102 pounds. Many medications are now on the "acceptable" list.

When you enter the bus you are given a medical history to fill out followed by a quick physical (blood pressure, temperature and test for iron), then the donation, and snacks. This all takes around 1 hour. The one pint of blood you donate will be replenished in 4 weeks. This one pint can be used to help three people. There is no substitute for blood.

The Big Red Bus will be coming to Redeemer from 8:30am to 1pm on:

December 19, February 13 and April 10.

This Christmas season we are dedicating the Angel Tree to our Child Care.

We will have the tree in the narthex at the beginning of December. We aren't setting a price range for the gifts because we know they will all be very thoughtful and generous. After wrapping the gift please tape the name tag on the package. There are currently 80 children in Child Care ranging from one year to eleven years. You have a lot of gift choices.


